Topping Up NCEA Once Again



Earlier this week the Government announced that NCEA students will once again be eligible to receive Learning Recognition Credits (LRCs) as part of their 2022 Qualification.

In essence, these credits provide a 'top up' or 'bonus' in recognition of disruptions to learning that have continued into this year.

There is debate around whether this support is actually needed this year, along with the impact of these credits on student learning and the integrity of our national qualification.

However, with these changes now confirmed it is better to leave the debate behind and for students (and parents) to focus on how LRCs will integrate with the NCEA qualification.

Learning Recognition Credits have shifted the benchmark for certificate endorsements and also for University Entrance. It is critical that students are familiar with the information in this <u>link</u>, which details the LRC changes.

Despite the shifting of the assessment goal posts so late in the academic year, it is important students keep their 'head in the game'. Hard work, planning and working alongside their teachers remain the formula for success.

Students must leave nothing to chance and make the most of the remaining 11 school weeks until NCEA examinations commence.

Some thoughts from our Board Chair

Our Board of Trustees Chair Greg Moyle responds to the reported rise in absenteeism from schools throughout New Zealand:

"In my view, the real cost of Covid-19 in our community is the loss of education by a significant percentage of our youth.

This loss is across the early education sectors of pre-school and primary schools, as well as our intermediate and secondary schools. It was evident after the three-month-plus lockdown in Auckland last year when schools reopened for the final school term of 2021 that absenteeism was rife in many secondary schools. However, an



informal poll based on speaking with school leaders revealed a wide variance which indicated an alarming pattern: at a private girls' school attendance was 100%; at a co-ed grammar school it was 80%; but at a South Auckland primary school it was 20%.

When students disengage at the intermediate or secondary stage of their education, the effect on them and our wider community is massive. Not only do they lose the opportunity to realise their true economic potential but, within our community, they risk becoming part of a group likely to be ensnared in a relative poverty trap, forever dependent upon community assistance as lifelong beneficiaries.

Whilst I can accept that some senior students may, for personal or economic reasons, have chosen to leave school and take up one of the many jobs on offer post-lockdown in early November, it should be a concern for all of us if our youth leave school before they are adequately prepared to become effectively contributing members of their community."

In Memoriam: Don Hammond

Albertian Don Hammond (1949-1952), a NZ Rugby League representative and captain, passed away on July 30, aged 85.

Don originally played for the Mount Albert Lions in the Auckland Rugby League competition.

He represented and captained Auckland and first played for the New Zealand Kiwis team in 1961.

Whilst making his debut in 1961, Don developed a lethal combination alongside another Albertian, Ron Ackland. Together they blended speed and ball-playing ability with strength, tackling tenacity and courage needed to prosper in the rugged forward battles.



From there on, Don went on to play in 20 test matches, including six as captain (1961-65). In 1964, Don won the Rothville Trophy as the Auckland Rugby League Player of the Year.



That year he also won the New Zealand Rugby League's Player of the Year award as he was a stand-out performer when the Kiwis whitewashed France in a three-test home series.

A stalwart of the Kiwis Association, Don was prominent in establishing and becoming curator of the excellent NZRL museum.

Don was inducted as an NZRL Life Member in 2006 followed by an induction into the Legends of League in 2010. He went on to be elected President of the Kiwis Association.
