John Parsons was a busy man at MAGS on Monday, presenting seminars on online safety to students, staff and parents throughout the course of the day.

Mr Parsons is New Zealand's leading authority on safeguarding children online. He covered topics such as online grooming, sexting, damaged reputations, cyber bullying, reputation management, learning to repel and report, and future-proofing for employment. Mr Parsons delivered some clear messages to students about how their identity and their 'digital identity' were one and the same, and that they should project a strong and confident image online.

He also said teenagers needed to respect the identity, privacy and feelings of friends and family with all their dealings in the digital world.



### Student device use in 2019



In 2019, students at all levels will be expected to bring their own device to assist with learning in the classroom.

- We are aware that some families have purchased other devices for use at intermediate school. These will continue to be suitable as well, as long as they have a screen size of at least 7.9".
- A mobile phone is not considered by the School to be a suitable primary device for learning, especially with regards to the creation of published work.
- A device which is more than three years old is usually not a good option for students. They are slower, cannot always update to the latest software and their batteries may not last the school day.

# Adobe Creative Cloud 2019 Subscriptions

Adobe Creative Cloud device licences are again available to our students for an annual subscription. The cost for 2019 will be \$13.

Adobe has introduced a new scheme for students called "named-user licences" and reduced the cost considerably.

A named-user licence includes all the latest Adobe Creative Cloud desktop apps. It includes all the latest Adobe mobile apps, including Capture CC and Photoshop Mix. The licence also includes file sharing and syncing.

The Adobe software programmes that we use in the senior school include Photoshop, Light Room, Illustrator, InDesign, Premiere Pro and After Effects. These are the current industry standard programms for designing work for print, web and moving image.



A student may install the software on a laptop and on a machine at home, but only use Creative Cloud on one computer at a time. There is no need to request two licences. The School can only offer licences to our students with a school email address, not to families. Adobe Creative Cloud is not required, but access on a home computer provides students studying NCEA

courses in Art Design, Photography and Media Studies with a significant advantage. The software is also useful for many other subjects.

Payment for a 2019 subscription will need to be made before Friday, 8 February, 2019. We will make the order according to payments made. The best option is to use online banking for the \$13 payment to this account:12-3029-0300684-00. Please make sure you include references as follows: **Student Name** and **Adobe**.

This will help you avoid queues at the start of the school year. You may also pay at the Finance Office when it is open during term time.

Students can access and use all Adobe software programs on their laptop or home desktop computer for 12 months. The licence is for Windows or Mac Computers. It is not available for Android tablets, nor iPads. Those with Adobe Creative Cloud in 2018 will need a new subscription if it is still required in 2019. The 2018 subscription expires on Friday, 8 February 2019.

This offer is available to all students at Mount Albert Grammar School. Although this offer is in place to assist senior students, junior students also wanting to have an Adobe Creative Cloud annual subscription may do so. Please remember that Adobe Creative Cloud is not for iPads, nor Android devices, although some mobile apps are available.

# Gold and Silver at NZSS Championships



Even a broken finger could not stop Hannah Adye from claiming Gold in the Junior Girls Pole Vault at the NZSS Track and Field Championships in Dunedin.

Hannah won Silver in the event last year and went one better this year despite breaking a finger while playing basketball about a week before the meet.

Although hampered by the injury, she decided to just give the championships a go, and once she started she couldn't be stopped. She attempted the national record of 3.51m, and narrowly missed it. Her final performance was 3.40m and this was MAGS first Gold medal at the NZ Schools Champs since Niven Longopoa in 2014.

Distance runner Luke Clements, pictured far right, also went one better this year, moving up from Bronze last year to Silver in the Junior Boys 2000m Steeplechase. Luke worked his



way through the field with rival Zane Powell from Kings College. Luke took the lead with two laps to go and held onto that lead until the last 40m. They both had a sprint finish and he just missed out on the Gold to fast-finishing Zane. He finished with a time of 6.15.64, which was 18 seconds under his own school record.
