Our caretaker Mike Hull (pictured at top with Mr Moyle) received a huge ovation when he was named as the winner of the Herb Towers Travel Prize for a professional development trip overseas. This award recognises outstanding service to MAGS.

The A Harmos Memorial Award went to Social Science Teacher Cherie Petueli and Head of Junior PE Andrew Scaife (both pictured right). These awards recognise staff who have been exceptional in supporting the school's mentoring programme.

The CP Liddell Staff Awards were presented by John Liddell, who gave some background to how they came about.

He said that he and his brother Chris benefited from the help they got at MAGS after their father passed away and the family hit financial difficulties. Mr Liddell had to work to support the family and he was told by then-Headmaster Maurice Hall to "come to school when he could", while Chris was supported in getting scholarships. Once family members were in a position to support MAGS, they decided on presenting student and staff scholarships each year.





This year they had doubled the number of staff recipients and hoped to fund all the scholarships in perpetuity.

The CP Liddell Staff Awards were presented to HOD Media Studies Simon Allen, Commerce Teacher Ratinder Gill, English Teacher Kelly Johnston and Assistant HOF Science Justin Hinds.

These scholarships are worth \$10,000 each and recognise excellence in teaching and contribution to the school.

At Year 9 Prizegiving in the afternoon, Eva Yarrow and Bailey Hamilton were named Best All-Round Year 9 Girl and Boy respectively.

For the first year, cups – named after long-standing staff members – were awarded for Year 9 academic achievement. Vanishka Das received the Elise Goddard Cup, while Joshua Radcliffe received the Greg Cave Cup (as pictured below).

parents.
