MAGnet powhiri

On Thursday, Year 12 students involved in the MAGnet programme were welcomed to Unitec with a powhiri at the campus marae. Among those greeting them were a group of Year 13 students who were part of last year's MAGnet programme.

Selected students spend one day a week at Unitec, and four days at MAGS undertaking a dedicated, hands-on course in either Building Skills or Automotive Engineering that complements their chosen vocational pathway.

At Unitec they will learn how apprenticeships work and how to connect with them.

The Unitec course and school subjects

all offer credits toward NCEA Level 2.

For students interested in

apprenticeships, looking to undertake

tertiary study or training on the job,

NCEA Level 2 is the minimum needed to

show they have the skills, competencies

and knowledge valued in the workplace.

MAGnet students may return to MAGS

for Year 13 and the opportunity to do a

Level 3 course with Unitec, and then, if a vocational pathway appeals, continue with an apprenticeship or tertiary course fulltime on leaving school.

Experience on a MAGnet course also gives preferential entry to Unitec's training programmes and courses.

Computer science for Year 12s

Year 12 students have a great
opportunity to study computer science
at Unitec this year.
MAGS in partnership with Unitec is
offering a free one-semester course
(approximately two terms) in Computer
Science starting on Thursday, February
15. Students will then attend whole-day
classes every Thursday after that
at Unitec's computer labs.
The course is hands-on with students learning programming, networking and digital media
skills. It covers website design and development, how to implement a local area network
for a home, and designing an advanced computer programme.

As well as gaining Level 2 Achievement Standards (12 credits), students can start a journey towards a career as a Computer Programmer, Digital Designer, Game Developer, Network Administrator, or jobs in Information Technology, Cyber Security or open up a variety of other pathways.

The course, which follows on from a pilot programme run in partnership with Unitec last year, also allows students to challenge themselves in a tertiary environment and build relationships with tech companies.

Reminder about shortened school days

Students have all now experienced their first full school day on timetable that coincided, due to the rain burst that hit the city yesterday, with the need to call the first Shortened Lunchtime.

This means lunchtime is shortened by 20 minutes to protect our students from extremes of weather conditions caused by rain, heat or wind and any issues associated with being outside at these times.

This results in the school day ending at 2.50pm and parents and caregivers are advised via the school app when a shortened day occurs.

School buses continue to run to their usual schedules and students are able to wait in the school hall until the normal school finish time of 3.10pm.

Parents and caregivers are reminded:

- Alberton Avenue can become a bottleneck for traffic at both ends of the school day.
- There are school buses arriving from up and down the road.
- Vehicles are not permitted into the school grounds to pick up students.

• A pick-up location that is a sensible distance from the school gates should be arranged with your child(ren).

Your assistance with keeping the school entrance and exit points safe for the student body is greatly appreciated.
