#### From the Headmaster

### Proud of our NZ Qualification

The National Certificate of Educational Achievement is now into its seventeenth year as New Zealand's National School Qualification.

Mount Albert Grammar School has been part of the evolution of this qualification from its inception in 2002. There has often been uncertainty and controversy

on this journey - and not without cause.

During this time NCEA has provided many hundreds of thousands of young people with a pathway after school into the tertiary sector and the workforce. But this improved academic success has cost our schools in other areas.

The unreasonable internal assessment loading facing today's school student, and indeed teachers, impacts daily on our goal of providing a broad learning experience. A senior student at MAGS can face up to 40 high-stakes internal assessments across an academic year – and this before they move into the end-of-year external examinations!

At MAGS, our academic pillar will always take priority but the school cannot stand on the one pillar alone. Arts, Sport and Service provide the critical breadth to growing good young people ... when our four pillars are strong, our school is strong!

It is with real concern that the recently proposed changes to NCEA signal an increase to internal assessment for Levels 1, 2 and 3 – particularly when schools were expecting the opposite to be revealed.

Such changes would further threaten the balance and breadth of the type of education offered at MAGS.

During the review period ahead, many Headmasters and Principals will be advocating for a significant reduction in internal assessments for senior students. It will be important for the Ministry to listen.

Thirty five Year 13 Economic students travelled to Waihi last Friday, with their teachers, to learn about the gold mining industry courtesy of Oceania Gold.

Students were able to observe the open cast Martha Mine and see the transformation process of changing quartz rock into gold and silver bars.

Mr Phillip Salmond of Oceania Gold provided information on the positive benefits and negative impacts of the mining operation on the



town of Waihi, one of the few places in the world where gold mining is undertaken near an urban area.

MAGS' Head of Commerce, Mr Andrew Maunder, said the trip was relevant to an assignment requiring students to study potential positive and negative impacts of economic activity, how to mitigate them and also how to find solutions. Students commented on how the mine is significant to a small town like Waihi and, in particular, the macro-economic benefits it brings to the population.
