Albertians giving back

MAGS students were fortunate to be able to hear about, and be inspired by, the experiences of two high-flying Albertians in the past week.

Last Friday, Albertian and tech entrepreneur Fia Jones (2013-17) addressed an assembly focused on Scholarship opportunities.

Fia, along with her Astrix Astronautics co-founders, are developing lightweight and efficient solar arrays for satellites. One of their prototypes was part of the payload for Rocket Lab's Electron rocket launch in April.

Fia talked to students about working hard but maintaining balance, and emphasised that rather than worrying about time management, she focused on energy management. She also advised students that failure was a great teacher, and not to be afraid of taking on challenges for fear of failure.

On Monday, Albertian Kevin Jia (2005-2009), a Professional Teaching Fellow at University of Auckland's Department of Engineering Science, spoke to our Prefects about his experience at university. He graduated in 2014 with a conjoint Bachelor of Engineering (Honours) with First Class Honours in Engineering Science, and Bachelor of Arts in Economics and Statistics. He then graduated with a Master of Science in Statistics. Kevin (pictured below) said while studying and passing exams was important, so was being a well-rounded person who took part in extra-curricular activities regularly. He advised students to be engaged with their lecturers and classmates as that would not only improve learning but also give them greater value from their campus life. He said he had carried with him the mantra that had been passed on to him by Mr McKinney (from 09MKY in 2005): "Be the best you can be".

Eighty One Years Ago Today



School Concerts began in 1926 and continued in this form until 1967.

Our Archivist Mr Murphy notes: "For most of the time they were held in the Town Hall. Items sung by this jumbo choir were listed in the programme as by 'The School'.



"In this 1941 concert they presented four brackets. In all they

sang: Caudeamus, The King is Still in London, The Army the Navy and the Air Force and then There's a Boy Coming Home on Leave and The Woodpecker Song. The third bracket was Bridge Builders and the hymn O God our Help in Ages Past. The last numbers were Ferry-Boat Serenade and O Ain't it Great to be in the Navy.

"It was wartime and all these songs would have been well received."
