Albertian Artists in the Frame





Len Castle

Potter Len Castle (1924 – 2011) is another leading New Zealand artist to have been educated at Mount Albert Grammar School, working in a field which developed as a major artform over the course of his 60-year career.

Castle trained as a secondary school science teacher, first teaching back at MAGS, then at Auckland Teachers' College. Alongside his day job, he began to create pottery, taking night classes to further his skills. His fascination for the craft was inspired in part by a demonstration he saw at the Auckland Easter Show as a child. The first potter to be awarded a New Zealand Art Societies Fellowship, in the late 1950s he went to St Ives in Cornwall to study with master potter Bernard Leach, a year which deepened his interest in Eastern ceramics and developed his work practice.

Working from homes in Titirangi set up for production with kilns and railways, Castle became a full-time potter in 1963, also founding that year the New Zealand Society of Potters. A QEII Arts Council Fellowship in 1966 enabled him to study in Japan and travel through China and South Korea. This experience helped to confirm a style which was influenced both by Asian aesthetics and his scientific knowledge of geological forms.

Internationally renowned and exhibited, Castle received recognition at home in gallery collections, the presentation of his work to visiting dignitaries, and honours reflecting his stature: CBE for services to pottery in 1986, a New Zealand Commemorative Medal for services to the country in 1990, an Arts Foundation of New Zealand Icon Award in 2003 and a DCNZM in 2004. Having learnt from a master potter, Castle's legacy speaks to his own mastery of the craft.

Southbase Construction requires a gate person for MAGS' Nairn Building project, with **the role commencing 1 August**.

The gate person will take control of and monitor deliveries, contractor arrivals and departures to ensure safe and controlled operations, and:

- will ideally have previous construction experience and/or a Traffic Controller (STMS) qualification.
- will have a full driver's licence.
- will receive Southbase Training to enable them to perform their role to Southbase's standards.
- could be a young person looking to get into construction or an experienced person.
- would need to be fit and mobile as they will cover a lot of ground on any given day.
- The hours would be 6.30am to 5.30pm, Monday to Friday. A minimum of 55 hours a week.
- The role will be a <u>fixed term contract</u> that would conclude at the end of next year (2023).
