We were delighted to have former Prime Minister the Right Honourable Helen Clark oversee the ceremony and, together with Greg Taylor, reveal the new plaque which will adorn the building.

Greg Taylor has a stellar association with MAGS. He arrived as a student in 1960 and excelled academically, being named as School Dux for 1964.

Upon graduating with a Masters degree with Honours in History from the University of Auckland, Greg trained and took up a career in secondary education. After teaching in a number of schools, he was drawn back to his alma mater and, in 1988, became the first

#### **Greg Taylor honoured**



MAGS' fifth headmaster Greg Taylor and former Prime Minister Helen Clark unveil the plaque rededicating E Block as the Greg Taylor Building.

At a ceremony this afternoon, E Block was rededicated as the Greg Taylor Building, with former Prime Minister Helen Clark as guest speaker.

Mr Taylor was MAGS' fifth Headmaster and the first Albertian to be appointed Headmaster

in 1988 and held the position until 2006. He presided over the introduction of girls to MAGS in 2000, and they were largely based in E Block before being slowly integrated into the wider school. Ms Clark, whose father was an Albertian before she became MP for Mt Albert, visited the school in 2000 as PM and presented a foundation badge to each girl in that foundation year. At the ceremony, one of our many Centenary events this year, Ms Clark spoke about Mr Taylor's impressive vision for the school and how he saw it as an integral part of the community, welcoming girls and accommodating the aquatic centre being among the major achievements during his tenure. Mr Taylor said it was fortuitous that plans were underway for E Block before the decision to admit girls was made,



and that it was ready in time for their arrival.

He said being recognised in such a way was an emotional moment for him, and he thanked Ms Clark for her kind words and for being his "greatest supporter" in his time as headmaster. He said he would never forget Ms Clark referring to MAGS as "my school" during a royal visit.

He also thanked all the invited guests – family, friends and former colleagues – for coming along in such trying times.

Before the the unveiling of the plaque, the girls choir Gloriana performed, and students performed a haka in honour of Mr Taylor following the unveiling. You can see more photos from the event <u>here</u>

#### First Kiwifruit harvest



One of Mr Hinds' Year 11 Agriculture classes has helped harvest our first ever Gold Kiwifruit crop in the 90-year history of the ASB MAGS Farm.

Farm Manager Peter Brice said, "This was a small crop, and we can anticipate 10 times the amount of fruit in the future once the orchard is fully functioning. "The Centennial Year's crop is by no means export quality but gives the students a small look into what happens on a commercial orchard and what management practices would be happening during a season. Year 13s study Zespri for an internal assessment, with the orchard tying in nicely to this subject."

Mr Brice added, "We have monitored our Brix (sugar) level to indicate when the crop should come off. It has risen from



6-8 a couple of weeks ago to 10 or 12 now. This is plenty enough sugar to allow the fruit to ripen off the vine and develop their beautiful golden colour. The fruit will be distributed among students and staff as they ripen."

#### Ninety one years ago today



This image shows WH Kedgley entering the School gates and winning the 1931 Steeplechase.

Our Archivist, Mr Murphy, notes: "The inner pillars have been removed. A modern truck could have not otherwise got in. The unsealed road and rank growth does not daunt the cyclists. Old-style electric poles had more wires than modern ones. The house on the corner remains."



Until 1958, this race was run on the roads around the mountain but, to keep runners safe from increasing traffic, was then switched to a course based mostly around the ASB MAGS Farm, as is the case these days.

## **Sports Update**

### Great showing at AKSS Athletics



The Auckland Athletics Championships finished on Tuesday after three days of competition to ensure the full meet was able to take place under the current Covid-19 rules.

Thirty four students took part, winning 15 medals.

MAGS Assistant Director of Sport Carlin Crossan said, "It was pleasing to see the Year 9 students perform to a high standard in their first time representing the school at an athletics event."

In track events, Kendra Scally-Tui (Year 9) impressed in the Junior Girls 100m and 200m, finishing 3rd and 2nd respectively. Ty Gonzales (Year 9) had a successful day on Tuesday, winning the Junior Boys 80m Hurdles and finishing 2nd in the Junior Boys Triple Jump. Elliot Kitchener continues to show why he is one of the most promising sprinters in Auckland with a third in the Senior Boys 200m and a first in the Senior Boys 100m. His 100m time was an impressive 11.67.

A special mention goes to Nina Chalmers (Year 10). After surpassing the Junior Girls 3000m record at our school athletics, she beat the school records in the 800m and 1500m. She topped off the meet with a 3rd place in the Junior Girls Long Jump.

In field events, Tommee Paeu (Year 11), in her first year competing in the Intermediate age group, finished 2nd in a competitive Intermediate Girls Long Jump.

Milly Clegg (Year 12) continued her good form from school athletics and finished 2nd in the Senior Girls High Jump. Taya Lewis (Year 12) finished 2nd in the Senior Girls Discus



with a personal best throw of 33.15m. Kingston Pupuke-Robati (Year 10) finished 2nd in the Junior Boys Discus. Ben Skelton (Year 13) showed great consistency with his throwing events, finishing 4th and 3rd in the Senior Boys Shotput and Discus respectively.

#### Rowers blow records out of water

Results from this year's North Island Secondary School Championships (NISSC) at Lake Karapiro show the MAGSROW squad put in their best performance since the rowing programme was re-established at MAGS in 2008.

MAGSROW achieved eight podium placings across the boys and girls NISSC events, vying

against 1440 competitors from North Island secondary schools.

The squad won five golds, finishing first in the Boys U18 Coxed Four, Boys U18 Coxless Pair Oars, Girls U17 Coxless Pair Oars, Boys U17 Coxless Pair Oars and the Boys U16 Coxed Four.

MAGSROW also won silver in the Boys U18 Coxed Eight and bronze in the Girls U18 Coxed Eight and Boys U18 Coxless Pair Oars.

Tallying the MAGSROW medal haul for this year's NISSC regatta, MAGS was fourth overall (for boys and girls events) on the medal table and earned 30 points. At the last NISS event – held in 2020 – MAGS was 25th overall and earned six points.

MAGSROW also put in an impressive performance at the Head of Harbour regatta held at Lake Pupuke last weekend (March 19), earning seven gold, four silver and five bronze medals.



It was almost a clean sweep in the coxed eight events, with the U18 Boys, U16 Girls and U16 Boys all winning gold, and the U18 Girls winning silver.

The squad also took out gold in the Boys U18 Coxless Pair, Boys U16 Coxed Four and the Girls U15 Double Sculls.

Silver medal finishes were awarded to MAGSROW in the Boys U18 Coxless Pair, and the Girls U18 and U17 Coxed Four events.

The squad secured bronze medals in the Girls U18 Coxless Pair, Boys U17 Double Sculls, Girls U17 Coxed Quadruple Sculls and the Boys U16 Double Sculls.

MAGSROW Head Coach Alice Denyer says the squad's achievements this year have made her incredibly proud.

"Our squad have committed to their training and their team-mates, and that is showing up in their performances on the water.

"MAGS has a strong rowing history and this squad is helping to grow that legacy."
