Relay for Life's bright prospects



The Relay for Life team has hit the ground running and has already raised a massive amount of money for the Cancer Society.

The total sits at around \$40,000 - almost halfway to the \$100,000 target - and that sum

will be augmented by proceeds from today's bright coloursthemed Mufti Day and bake sales (as pictured below). The Science Department were among staff who got into the spirit of things with their colours-of-the-rainbow ensembles (pictured right). MAGS' Relay for Life organiser Alayna Pulham said the 300 spots available to MAGS students in the event were snapped up in 12 minutes this year, such is its popularity. She said, "Each student has an individual goal of raising \$200 for the cancer society and already 45 students have surpassed this. Some students have already been promoted on the NZ Relay for Life Facebook page as "Superstar Fundraisers" for raising over \$500. The whole



group has a team goal of raising \$100,000 for the third year in a row.

"All money raised goes towards the Cancer Society and provides free nursing, psychology, accommodation, transport and other key services to people in our community affected by cancer."

The Relay for Life starts at 2pm on March 21 at Lovelock Track and ends at 9am the next day, with students trying to do as many laps as possible of the track.

A MAGS family tradition



Prefect and House Boy Theo Coker-Grey (pictured right) is continuing a fine family tradition that began with his greatgrandfather H.L. (Harry) Grey, a Prefect and foundation pupil at MAGS in 1922

(pictured top left). Harry was a day boy who travelled to school by train from Helensville, after milking the cows on the family farm each morning.

He went on to study for a civil engineering degree at Auckland University before working for a surveyor as a cadet. He also worked on the Arapanui hydro-electrical dam before setting up the family farm at Glen Murray (south of Mercer) that Theo's family lives on now.

Harry's younger brother R.B (Bob) Grey also attended MAGS, and was one of the first Albertians, if not the first, to become a GP.



There have been other family connections in the almost 100 years since then with Theo's grandfather R.L. (Robert) Grey and great uncle J.C. (John) Grey also attending MAGS and boarding at School House in the 1950s.

Both played 1st XV rugby and were keen and talented rowers, and rowed for MAGS in the Eight that won the Maadi Cup in 1951. John Grey was also a Prefect.

Theo, who plays Premier Basketball, says he wasn't initially aware of the family connections to MAGS but has learned more about them in recent years.

Astronomy Club lifts off

The MAGS Astronomy Club has been established to foster an interest in amateur astronomy.

The club, overseen by Mathematics teacher Diego Alarcon, will be dedicated to observing the sky and learning about the universe, and sharing that understanding and appreciation of astronomy with students, parents and friends of MAGS.

In addition, the club aims to share the Tātai arorangi (Māori astronomical knowledge), which is considered as part of the Kauwae-runga, the Māori body of knowledge that

encompasses creation, the gods, stars, time and celestial matters.

The club has an Instagram account – @astroclubmags – as its main means of communications that students, parents and teachers can follow and interact with.

There will also be six workshops across the year on specific themes such as astronomy without a telescope and planetary science. Students have indicated that their preference is to use technology to connect and expand their knowledge of this topic rather than weekly or fortnightly meetings that may overload their extracurricular schedule.



Mr Alarcon said, "We hope that this new format will encourage more students to participate."

At the moment, the club has over 200 students who receive daily information. The students also provide feedback to the club every time that they give a like to the content.

Astronomy conference opportunity

The Royal Astronomical Society of New Zealand (RASNZ) is offering to pay for some high school students to attend its annual conference in Wellington (Friday, May 8 to Sunday, May 10).

This year's conference marks the 100th anniversary since the Society formed. The normal conference registration fee is around \$300, however the Society is waiving this cost for 10-15 young astronomers who are keen to attend. In addition, the cost of the Saturday night banquet, travel costs to/from the conference city and accommodation (usually backpackers) for the Friday and Saturday nights are paid for by a generous benefactor.

To be considered, students should email a short statement of no more than 300 words explaining why they would like to attend the conference and why they are



interested in astronomy. This statement should be sent to RASNZ Immediate-Past President John Drummond (email: <u>kiwiastronomer@gmail.com</u> by Friday, March 27, 2020, 5pm. Entrants must include name, gender, school, city, age, year of study at school in 2020, email address, telephone contact and science teacher's name/phone/email. The winners of the competition (aimed at Senior students) will be selected for their clear enthusiasm for astronomy, seniority, and good English in their submitted statement. Those who win the free registration/travel/accommodation will be notified around April 10. If you need help with your statement, Mr Alarcon (room MH4) is happy to help.

Robotics Club excels at Nationals



Last weekend, the MAGS Robotics Club competed in the 2020 New Zealand Vex Robotics Competition National Championships.

The Vex Robotics Competition is a global event in which teams design, build, program, and drive a robot to play in a game that changes year on year. This year's game involved stacking a pile of plastic cubes into small goal zones and placing cubes into raised cups up to around 1m tall.



This year, three teams (with a robot each) entered. One of them managed to place 25th out of 64, a great achievement considering the club's lack of a coach and not having the latest equipment. This robot entered the tournament-style eliminations rounds and performed admirably against the second and third-placed robots but lost the match by a close margin. The club will soon be recruiting for the new season, so be sure to keep an eye on the Daily Notices.

Tutoring Service at MAGS

The MAGS Academic Council runs an all-year-round peer tutoring service that any student can use.

The programme consists of experienced senior tutors assisting other students in their academic studies.

This service is open to all MAGS students for most subjects at both Junior Levels and all levels of NCEA. This programme will be highly beneficial for students who require further assistance with NCEA assessments, building a strong academic foundation at junior levels, or general guidance for subjects.

Tutoring can either be paid or free (where student tutors receive service points from the school) and you can have as many tutoring sessions as you need, (e.g. one or two before a test or for the whole year.
