Planned teacher strike on May 29

If the strike action planned by both primary and secondary unions on Wednesday, 29 May goes ahead, Mount Albert Grammar School will be closed for instruction across all year levels 9-13.

However, exams for Year 11 students, and others sitting Level One NCEA Practice Examinations, will still go ahead on that day with supervision by non-union staff, and students are expected to attend their examinations.

Drama unfolds at Alberton





Historic homestead Alberton was the backdrop for Year 11 Drama and Year 10 Academy Drama students as they performed short plays set in the late 1800s to early 1900s.

The performances on Wednesday were part of their Level 1 Drama Devising unit, which challenges them to create a scenario that might have happened in the time of the Kerr-Taylors, the original owners of Alberton.

The works focused on issues such as women's suffrage, arranged marriages, army conscription, and dysfunctional families – and were staged in the ballroom apart from one set in the kitchen.

Students visit Alberton early on in the unit to learn about the house and family, and to scout sets. Victorian/Edwardian costumes are sourced to evoke the feel of the era.

Year 10 Business students put lessons into practice when they opened food stalls at lunchtime yesterday and today.

Students flocked to the stalls selling drinks and food such as sushi, burgers, kebabs and fudge brownie. As part of Market Day, the Year 10 Business students formulate, carry out and review a business activity that involves selling food and/or drinks. It also tests their marketing and presentation skills.

Groups fund their own start-up costs and share profits among business owners.

After Market Day, students are encouraged to reflect on where their businesses had succeeded or failed. Market Day is a taster for business activities to follow in years 11, 12 and 13 when business students build on earlier skills to develop more sophisticated products and services.



Year 11 exams

Year 11 exams take place in Week 5 – from Monday, May 27 through to Tuesday, June 4 inclusive.

Exams will go ahead on May 29 despite the planned teacher strike, and please note that Monday, June 3 is Queen's Birthday and there will be no exams as school will be closed. Students should read the exam timetable and instructions carefully. They can be downloaded by clicking <u>here</u>. All students need to check the timing of their exams carefully as they vary from normal lesson times.

Year 11 students are on exam leave during this time. Year 11s must only attend school to sit an examination or, with the written permission of a staff member, for tutorial or study purposes. At all other times they must be at home studying. Year 11 students taking Level 2 or Level 3 subjects may be able to attend these classes within their study and exam commitments. However, Level 1 exams take precedence and subject teachers are aware that Year 11 is on official exam leave.

Students should have been contacted via email by Miss Rose if they have a clash, with a new date for one of their exams. It is important that they check their email carefully and follow the instructions for the new date. If they have not received an email or if they have approved leave during the exams, then they will need to go to the Student Centre to request a change.

Albertian making it in Dubai

During a stopover in Dubai, while heading off on his Woolf Fisher Fellowship, Headmaster Patrick Drumm caught up with Albertian Shane O'Brien. Mr O'Brien (1974-78) is on the school's Honours Boards for various achievements. Most notably, he won a Gold medal in rowing as part of the Coxless Fours at the 1984 Olympic Games as well as a Silver medal in the Coxless Four and a Bronze medal in the Eight at the 1986 Commonwealth Games.

He was a Prefect in 1978, played for the First XV from 1977 to 1978, was the Rowing Eight captain in 1978, and an Auckland Secondary Schools' rugby representative.



Mr O'Brien also returned to MAGS for a short time to teach.

He has just been appointed Director of Jumeira English Speaking School in Dubai – regarded as the top International School in Dubai. He had been Head of the Senior School at JESS for the past eight years.

Helpers on the farm



In sunshine and showers, various groups of cheerful and hard-working students have helped Peter Brice and Richard Fullerton to clear the neglected area of native wetland that was overgrown with what is thought to be alligator weed.

This plant grows in waterways and chokes streams. Its incredibly long stems intertwine and make it hard to remove without cutting with flax knives then rolling into a ball. These balls of stems are very heavy and require several people to lift them.

Students from a Duke of Edinburgh Silver service programme, TeenAg Club, and, of course, the Enviro Club slaved, sweated and got wet and muddy and the job is not yet finished.

Over the coming months, more weeds will be sprayed, cut and generally removed – and hopefully the surviving natives that have been released from



their weedy prisons will thrive.

PE, in particular the Tough Guys and Girls, will help to cultivate the area by running through and over the weeds.

Next year, the area will be densely planted with a range of native plants to help suppress weed regrowth and it is intended a short boardwalk will be constructed from the stile to the centre of the stream to allow water sampling.

Signing in and out of school

Should a student need to leave school early, they must sign out of school via the Student Centre – this includes pre-arranged departures or illness.

Should a student suddenly take ill while at school, they need to visit the School Nurse, who will assess the need to go home and ensure their attendance reflects exactly what has taken place.

Health & Safety regulations guide the requirement for your child to sign out, specifically related to school-based emergencies such as a fire.

In such an event, if a student is marked present at school and has left without signing out, we have a duty of care to check our facilities to locate them in case they are unable to exit a building. Please ensure your child is aware of this requirement.

Spectacular Mt Taranaki trek



Last week, the 13 Outdoor Education class tramped the Around the Mountain Circuit in Taranaki/Egmont National Park over three days.

Students had to plan their routes, find out about the significance of the place they were visiting, create a gear list, consider the environment they were entering and how they could care for it, plan their menu, and identify the likely risks and how to mitigate them. As the class was split into small groups and because they were walking from dawn to dusk each day carrying 15-20kg packs, they could practise their leadership skills under testing conditions.



The Around the Mountain Circuit goes through forest, across rivers and has spectacular alpine scenery.

A definite highlight was staying in Syme Hut. At 2000m above sea level, it is the North Island's second highest hut and provides extensive views of the Taranaki region, the central plateau and the Mt Taranaki summit. Thank you to Mr Belson for helping with this trip.
