Healthy attitudes

The week-long Health Expo held in the school hall drew to a close today as Year 12 Health students wrapped up their awareness campaigns. Crowds of students have packed the hall out during the week, checking out the stalls and collecting freebies. Year 12 Health students had to identify a health issue in the MAGS community, research the topic, develop resources, present their expo and then evaluate the effectiveness of it. This is giving students first-hand experience of how health promotion works. Some of the health issues covered this year were: how to cope with stress, how to report cyber bullying, nutritional support (e.g. reading labels), selfesteem and self-expression, peer pressure, bullying, and body image. The students are working towards an achievement standard, which is a health promotion assignment.

Moth plant eradication efforts rewarded

Helping to rid neighbourhoods of moth plant proved a rewarding exercise for MAGS students in more ways than one.

Students took part in a competition to collect the seed-containing pods of the invasive species, with Izzy and Lucia MacKenzie (pictured right) coming out winners with 2600 pods collected.

For their efforts they each received a \$500 Prezzy card in a competition funded by Auckland Council and Weedbusters.

Alana Kerr came third with 2051 pods and received a \$500 Prezzy card, Sophie Thomson fourth (2003 – \$300 Prezzy card) and Nicholas James 5th (1894 – \$100 Prezzy card). In all, 32,926 pods were removed during the competition.

Ms Goffin said the council was impressed by and grateful for the student's efforts. Mr Ashby, HOD Physics, is the driving force



behind the competition and hopes it will go from strength to strength and help to eradicate moth plant, which smothers and kills plants up into the canopy, preventing the establishment of native plant species.

Harbour saviours brainstorm ideas



Snorkelling at Goat Island marine reserve and taking a hovercraft ride on the Manukau Harbour were among the highlights for Izzy MacKenzie and Caitlin Mitchell when they took part in the Young Leaders Programme.

The three-day forum based at Te Manukanuka o Hoturoa Marae brought together young leaders from across the region to learn about issues facing the Manukau Harbour.

CaitIn said they also went to the wastewater treatment plant in Mangere, the Otuataua Stonefields, and Mathiesons Bay to see the huge contrast in marine life between there and Goat Island.

On the last day they worked on courses of action to help the Manukau Harbour that they will be carrying out.

The programme was run by Auckland Council's Sustainable Schools team in partnership with the Manukau Harbour Forum, the Department of Conservation and Kowhai Olsen from Makaurau Marae.

Sustainable Schools will help the students develop their ideas and their environmental efforts through a year-long mentoring programme. This includes joining further workshops, strengthening the students' leadership skills, teaching them how to pitch projects, connecting them with other environmental enthusiasts and setting them up to mentor another cohort next year.

Taking a world view

Nine students represented MAGS at the Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA) and three came back with an award.

Last Friday and Saturday, the Year 12 and 13 students represented three United Nations delegations for the MUNA, hosted by Auckland Rotary at Auckland Girls Grammar School. Over the two days, Juliette Allen, Simon Percival and Phoebe Sullivan represented Albania; Saman Bardi, India Bulman and Alyssa Houma represented Colombia; and Britney Cheng, Fatima Imran and Rachel Simpson represented Iraq.

Rachel, Fatima and Britney's speech that convincingly and eloquently defended Iraq's position on the protection of women's rights so impressed the judges they received an award for the 'Team with the Best Knowledge and Provocative Use of the UN Charter'.



Year 11 exams start next week

Year 11 exams begin next Tuesday, 29th May, and run to Wednesday, 6th June. Students should read the exam timetable and instructions carefully. They can be downloaded by clicking <u>here</u>.

The purpose of these exams is to provide students with the experience of NCEA formal examination conditions, plus provide an indication of their progress to date.

Students are on exam leave during this time and normal lessons resume on Thursday, 7th June.



Year 11s must only attend school to sit an examination or, with the written permission of a staff member, for tutorial or study purposes. At all other times they must be at home studying. Students are not permitted to be at St Lukes mall during the school day or at the mall in school uniform.

All students need to check the timing of their exams carefully as they vary from normal lesson times and there are different exam times for Wednesday, 30th May and Thursday, 31st May. Correct uniform must be worn to exams. Students will not be admitted to an examination in incorrect uniform.

Year 11 students taking Level 2 or Level 3 subjects may be able to attend these classes within their study and exam commitments. However, Level 1 exams take precedence and your teachers are aware that you are on official exam leave.

Status quo for out-of-zone enrolments

At its recent meeting, the Mount Albert Grammar School Board of Trustees decided that the 2018 out-of-zone ballot conducted later this year for 2019 enrolments would once again be held only for siblings of current students (a current student being one that is attending in 2019). The restriction (Priority 2 under the Enrolment Scheme) on eligibility for out-of-zone ballots is due to increasing demand for places at Mount Albert Grammar School from families who live inside the school zone.

Major changes to bus network

When Term 3 starts on Monday, 23 July, the school bus service 007 (Balmoral to Mount Albert Grammar and Mount Albert Grammar to Balmoral) will no longer be operating.

This bus service will continue to operate until the end of Term 2 (Friday, 6 July).

The journeys these bus services provided can be made using other public bus services operating on St Lukes Rd and Balmoral Rd.

These changes are part of a wider public transport review affecting all of Auckland. Most Central Auckland suburb public bus routes will be changing on Sunday, 8 July.

Some bus routes are changing to remove differences between the morning and returning afternoon routes to make them easier to understand and use. Some routes are changing due to low patronage.
