Centenary Eight christening

MAGSROW christened its newest rowing boat, the 'Centenary Eight', last weekend and acknowledged the generous donors who made it possible.

Fifty years ago, donors helped fund the 'Jubilee Eight' for the MAGSROW squad, and MAGSROW steering committee member Roger McGarry says he was inspired to see if he could generate support for another eight to coincide with the school's centenary



celebrations last year. "Now that MAGS is a co-ed school with a co-ed rowing squad, it seemed fitting to focus on an eight for the girls," says Roger. "We were really pleased by the support we received, which came from both



Albertians and their families, and the families of students who are currently in our squad." Donors included the family of the late Bruce Culpan, the Liddell family, Greg Moyle, the family of former and current squad coxswains Meg and Guy Pinfold, Emma Rush and the MacGillivray family, the Mitchell family, the Boersen family, the Kerry Ashby Endowment Fund and a contribution from the MAGS Foundation. Generous donations were also made by Kerry Lee, alongside David and Percy Clark, towards the cost of the oars. In recognition of their generosity, donors were presented with miniature oars mounted on wood from the Jubilee Eight (pictured above).

The Centenary Eight boat has been purchased specifically for the girls programme and is tailored to the girls' sizes with state of the art carbon fibre construction and fitted out with the latest in rowing technology.

This boat (pictured in action below) has already proven to be very successful, helping the senior girls crew to earn a bronze medal at the North Island Secondary School Regatta and make the A final of the Girls U17 Coxed Eight at the Maadi Cup.

Director of Rowing James O'Sullivan said, "The ability to invest in great boats, like the Centenary Eight, and to run a great programme that allows our students to reach their potential is really only possible with the incredible generosity of supportive donors and volunteers."

MAGSROW self-funds all of its rowing equipment and relies on sponsorship, volunteers and assistance in a wide range of areas to strengthen its programme.

A brief history of rowing at MAGS



In 1936 Mount Albert Grammar School and Sacred Heart College became the first schools in New Zealand to offer rowing as a sport for their students. MAGS developed close ties with the West End Rowing Club; ties that have continued to this day. Our Assistant Archivist Mr Cave says, "Inter-school competitions seem to have started in 1938, and for many years Mount Albert was at the forefront of rowing in New Zealand. MAGS was also the inaugural winner of the prestigious Maadi Cup in 1947, and has won it eight times, with the bulk of those titles coming in the 1950s.

Mr Cave adds, "In 1984 Shane O'Brien (student from 1974 to 1978) was a member of the New Zealand team which won the Olympic gold medal in the coxless four. Two years later at the Edinburgh Commonwealth Games he won a silver medal in the coxless four and a bronze in the eights."

Rowing at MAGS went into a hiatus in the mid-1980s but returned under Headmaster Dale Burden (pictured above in 2011 christening a boat) when the 2011 Albertian reported: "Mount Albert Grammar School Rowing has now completed its first full season since the 1980s".

Mathematicians taking on the world



During the last week of Term 1, four of our students took part in the International Maths Modelling Challenge – and their solution has been judged as one of the top two entries from New Zealand.

That means that Year 13 student Anatol Coen, Year 12s Jacob Miller and Ryan Shen, and Year 11 Victor Coen will now move forward to be judged internationally against the best entries submitted from across the world.

The problem they worked on for five days straight was to come up with mathematical models to determine the best use for a specific plot of land in the vicinity of New York that factored in variables such as "geography, climate, business options, community needs and local culture".

International judging should take place next month.

Earthquake fundraiser a success

Interact's Term 1 fundraiser for those affected by the earthquakes in Turkey and Syria was a great success.

Students promoted the cause in assemblies, went around form classes and held a bake sale in Week 9.

TIC Miss Barlow said, "It was the most baking I think we've received while I've been TIC of Interact and we were selling right up to the bell. Overall, we raised \$1454 to be donated to the Red Cross, who are on the ground helping those in need."

MAGS parking restrictions

Please be aware that parking restrictions are also in place at MAGS on the school grounds outside of school hours.

The only parking on site available to all supporters, visitors, students, parents and staff are a very limited number of <u>white parks</u> in the bottom car park. Once the parks are full, the



school carpark will be closed and monitored and only pool patrons will be allowed to enter.

Mount Albert Aquatic Centre patrons will have access at all times during the day to the bottom car park, and the <u>yellow</u> <u>marked car park spaces which are allocated for pool patrons</u> <u>only</u>.

All cars will need to display their parking pass or pool receipt on their dash to ensure that they are not towed from these council parking spots. Please note there are also 'No Parking' or '24hr Tow away' areas clearly indicated. If you park here, you also risk being towed.

To make sure that you are not disappointed when travelling to watch games at MAGS, we recommend that you park on the

surrounding roads and walk to the games via the Alberton Ave entrances. We understand the frustrations with parking in Auckland so want to make sure you are prepared when travelling to MAGS sporting events.

Lacrosse player represents NZ



In the April school holidays, Benji Norris (Year 13, pictured above) travelled to Perth, Western Australia, to compete in the U18 Australian Lacrosse Championship as part of the New Zealand Boys team.

As well as NZ, the championship consisted of the top male and female players representing Western Australia, South Australia and Victoria.

The New Zealand Boys were a younger team than last year and had two Albertians in Sam Nash and Liam Baber.

Their playing went from strength to strength, with results improving considerably over the week. Their first game saw a 15-3 loss, but the play-off for third/fourth on the final day was much closer, losing 7- 6 in the last 20 seconds to South Australia.

Unfortunately, COVID has disrupted the Auckland School Boys Lacrosse competition, which has has paused, but keep an eye on notices in case the competition restarts.
