Last night, MAGS Alumini, colleagues and friends gathered in the FW Gamble Hall to

honour our own Warwick Gibbs for his 50 years of unbroken service to MAGS.

The event organised by the Albertians Association saw Warwick recognised as the 2021 Albertian of the Year – only the second nonalumnus to receive the award in the 100-year history of the school (Warwick attended Auckland Grammar as a student).

It was fitting to be celebrating Warwick in a setting surrounded by our honours boards. So many of those students, with their names recorded in gold, can credit their success to the influence and expertise of Warwick Gibbs.

Not just an outstanding teacher, Warwick has added strength across all of the MAGS pillars with his work in coaching sport and his magnificent musicianship, which continues to fill the FW Gamble Hall on a daily basis.

In the present day, when long service is a rare commodity and undervalued, we salute our own MAGS taonga, who has helped to guide our community for over five decades!

### Albertian of the Year 2021: Warwick Gibbs

Last night, our Academic Dean Mr Gibbs was honoured as Albertian of the Year 2021 for his 50 years of outstanding service to MAGS across its Four Pillars.

At a ceremony hosted by the Albertians Association in the FW Gamble Hall, tributes flowed for Mr Gibbs, who has taught fulltime for all those 50 years as well as making an immense contribution in all areas of school life.

Mr Gibbs' long-time colleague Mr Cave had the tough task of summarising Mr Gibbs' achievements and contributions over that time.

He spoke of Mr Gibbs' huge influence across Academia, Arts, Service and Sport. Mr Gibbs, who began as an English and Junior French teacher in 1972, has been a driving force in the Languages Department – establishing German for Juniors as well as overseeing the introduction of Te Reo, Chinese and Japanese in his 30 years as HOD Languages.

In the sporting realm, Mr Gibbs has coached or managed cricket, rugby and golf over the years.

He has been the school pianist ("the piano man" as at least one student knew him) since the 70s, playing at assemblies and supporting musical productions. Mr Cave said, "For as long as I have known him, Warwick has been prepared to give his own



time to his students, and to the students of others as well. He is still often found before and after school, giving extra lessons to students to improve their grades and to help students who started German late to catch up."

In his speech, Mr Gibbs said it was the relationships he had built with his students that had kept him in the classroom at MAGS for 50 years. He had no desire to chase promotion, and didn't even have a CV.

His philosophy about teaching was summed up when he won a 2018 ASG National Excellence in Teaching Award: "Time with the young is never wasted. In a world where adults (including teachers) are so busy with their jobs and paperwork, one-on-one communication across the generations is reducing.

"I spend every interval and lunch with the students. At least the students take some time off and they are ever ready for discussion. My office is full of students wanting to share new things, discuss current affairs or talk about history, sport or anything they fancy. It becomes a place where they are out of the elements and also safe. You realise what it means when they and/or their parents write to you to say how much they appreciate it." Fittingly, Mr Gibbs rounded out the evening by playing piano accompaniment as guests sang the School Hymn.

# Albertian Artists in the Frame



Born Barrie Bates, Billy Apple (1935 – 2021) attended MAGS from 1949-51. He worked in design and advertising before leaving for London in 1959 to study at the Royal College of Art.

Bates became Apple in 1962. Bleaching his hair and eyebrows to fashion an artistic identity and look, he introduced Billy Apple to the world in his first London solo show, then relocated to New York in 1964. A friend of David Hockney and Ridley Scott and one of Andy Warhol's collaborators, Apple was part of the pop art vanguard of the 1960s and the 1970s conceptual art movement. By the mid-1970s, he was a big enough name to be exhibited at both London's Serpentine and on two New Zealand exhibition tours. In the 1980s, his work explored the commercial side of art, culminating in a \$85,000 solid gold apple created for high-flyer Ray Smith at the height of the stock market boom.

Returning to Auckland in 1990, Billy Apple was made an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit in 2005. Later projects included participating in Dr Craig Hilton's The Immortalisation of Billy Apple® (2010 - creating a replicating cell line now held in Auckland and Virginia) and The Analysis of Billy Apple's Genome (2014 - sequencing and digitizing his genome) and a horticulture project to create a Billy Apple®... apple.

A major retrospective was held in 2015 which coincided with the launch of Billy Apple Ciders. He was named as an Icon by the Arts Foundation of New Zealand in 2018, an honour accorded to only 20 living New Zealanders.

Invited back to MAGS by Board of Trustees Chair Greg Moyle in 2019, Billy created an artwork for the School Collection which uses the school colours of his time here.

Ninety Eight Years Ago Today

There were notable people in this 1924 Cricket 1st XI. Weir was Head Prefect in 1926 and Captain of both Cricket and Rugby in that year. Bush was Head Prefect in 1927 and was also Captain of both Cricket and Rugby as well as Tennis Champion.



In later life, Barnes became a trade unionist with a national profile, and links with the ILO.

Bush and Butler represented New Zealand at Rugby, and Weir represented New Zealand at Cricket. Bush, Butler and Weir served in conflict zones as mid-ranked officers during World War II.

Bush was taken prisoner of war. Weir became HOD English here, then Deputy Headmaster and Acting Headmaster. Butler returned to teach here and became inaugural Headmaster at Mount Roskill Grammar School.
