#### MAGS to the fore at Anzac Service

MAGS' Prefects and Cadets were to the fore at the Anzac Day Service at the Mount Albert War Memorial Hall on April 25.

Prefects paraded, sold poppies, helped set up, served Anzac cookies and cups of tea, and laid wreaths (Deputy Head Prefects Tali Afele and Maria Boow). Air Cadet Ben Hume was Parade Commander on the day, while Air Cadet Rohan Patel (pictured) raised and lowered the flag during the service. Cadet (and Prefect) Henri Blakeley, who spoke at MAGS' Anzac Service, was one



of the guest speakers on the day along with Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern and Col. Esther Harrop, MNZM Logistics Commander.

Henri spoke about the loss of life during World War I, and particularly the NZ 6th Field Brigade that fought to the death in Egypt.

Col. Harrop spoke about her grandfather Andy Kronfeld, an Albertian who flew a Spitfire in

Britain during World War II. The plane was bought with money raised by Western Samoa via contributions for every crate of bananas sold.



## Kapa Haka eighth at Polyfest

MAGS' Kapa Haka were first up on the Maori Stage at Polyfest on April 17 and battled terrible conditions to finish in eighth place in Division 1.

HOD Te Puna o Wairaka Ms Paul said, "Overall, the weekend went well and the kapa produced a really good performance given the circumstances (the really early wake-up time and the weather on the day – it poured down!), and stood with much ihi, wehi and wana.

"In summary, we placed eighth overall out of 14 kapa in Division 1 and had some close aggregate placings that would have seen us place third in some disciplines had it not been for one or two points.

"Looking ahead, we plan to have a debrief to go through the results and judges' comments in more detail, and to discuss how we can better prepare ourselves next year with the aim to improve our overall competitive results and campaign in general."



#### Tickets on sale for The Crucible

From May 17-20, Level 2 Drama is performing the first Drama production of the year – *The Crucible*.

The Arthur Miller play is a historical drama about the Salem Witch Trials of 1692-1693. Around this time, the small town of Salem, Massachusetts, hanged people convicted of being witches. The shows are at 7pm in the Dance and Drama room (E9) from Monday to Thursday, May 17 to 20.

There are two casts performing so if you're coming to see a particular student, ask them about the right night to see them.

#### Sylvia Brunt earns scholarship



Rugby Girls 1st XV Captain Sylvia Brunt is the latest MAGS student to be awarded a scholarship by the Tania Dalton Foundation.



Sylvia (pictured above, 2nd from right at rear, with other scholarship recipients) played for the Blues in the first women's Super Rugby game – against the Chiefs - last weekend and scored a try. Playing at centre, she was alongside **Blues winger and Albertian Princess** Elliott, who was a previous Tania Dalton scholarship winner. A Prefect at MAGS, Sylvia is also an Athletics champion, and captains the Rugby Girls Sevens. The Tania Dalton Foundation was created in honour of the Silver Fern netballer, who died in 2017. The Foundation exists to inspire young

women to be the best they can be through sport, by coordinating a range of programmes aimed at making a positive

#### and measurable impact.

The main initiative for the Foundation, launched four years ago, is the Scholarship Programme, which honours Tania Dalton's passion for supporting young women in sport. The three-year scholarship provides financial support (\$5000 per year), pastoral support, one-on-one mentoring and personal development workshops.

The 2018 recipients are now part of the alumni, committed to supporting future recipients.

The image above shows the Presentation of the Old Boys' Athletic Cup in 1938. Archivist Brian Murphy said, "The Cup commemorates an *annus mirabilis* in sport." Those in the photograph are: D Sumner, WH Tongue, Mr FW Gamble, Mr W Caradus, RC Aiken, NB Body and VC Butler. "In that year we won the Senior Championship in Cricket, Rugby, Association Football (both the Championship and the Knockout Cup), Hockey (all 22 games), the inter-secondary Schools Senior Athletics and the Rowing Head of the Harbour.

"No other sports had the inter-school competitions then, but in swimming PS Hannon won the New Zealand 100yd Freestyle Championship. It was a clean-sweep year for the school." # Sports Update

#### Boys Orienteers' fifth straight NISS win



Last weekend, MAGS' Boys Team won the North Island Secondary

Schools Orienteering Championships and the Girls Team narrowly missed out on the title. MAGS' Boys Captain Angus Edwards received the Champion Boys Team award – the fifth year in a row that MAGS has won it.

The Boys had a runaway victory, securing 479 points in beating Havelock North (2nd with 332 points) and Westlake Boys in third.

There were podium places for Tom Aish (2nd) and Matthew Greenwood (3rd) in the Sprint, and a Relay win for the Intermediate Boys (Sam Carryer, Justin Brendolise and Matthew Greenwood).

MAGS Intermediate Boys teams took out the top three places on the podium, while the Senior Boys Team (Tom Aish, Angus Edwards, Callum Wishart) finished 3rd as did the Junior Boys team (Thomas Alsweiler, Victor Coen, James Milne).

In the Girls competition, MAGS finished in third place on 407 pts, narrowly behind St Cuths (431 pts) and Baradene (416 pts). The highlight of the event was a win in the Intermediate Girls relay, with Ella Edwards, Ella Graves and Eve Thompson beating very strong competition.

There were strong performances across all girls grades with Top 10 finishes for Anna

Batcheler (Sprint & Long), Molly McGowan (Sprint & Long), Ami McGowan (Sprint & Long), Nicole Abbott, Ella Edwards, Asmara Hillen and Kate Rogers.



## Higher rowing honours



Following their Maadi Cup Gold medals, Nick Bryan (above left) and Cam MacGillivray (above right) have been selected for higher honours.

Cam was selected for the Rowing New Zealand U18 North Island team, specifically the eight and the coxed four, which raced against the South Island team during the middle weekend of the school holidays at Lake Karapiro.

Nick has been selected for the Rowing New Zealand U19 squad in the Men's Eight. The crew will train throughout the winter. This squad would normally travel and race at the Junior World Championships in late August, however this is unlikely to happen.

At this stage it is unknown if they will compete as a crew but as with other Rowing New Zealand squads, the crews are selected and will train as if the championships are going ahead.
