It's been said before that 80% of being successful in life is showing up.

These words resonated loudly this week with the release of an Education Review Office report highlighting the disturbing school attendance statistics for New Zealand students.

The graph below (please click on it to enlarge) speaks for itself when comparing regular attendance of school students across different countries. And remember that even if someone is classified as attending school regularly (i.e. 90% attendance), that still means they are missing one day of school every fortnight!

This report comes on the back of the Ministry of Education announcing that two-thirds of Kiwi students failed the recent NCEA writing standards. Unbelievably, only 2% of students in Decile 1 schools passed the standard!

There are many places to point fingers as to the causes behind these results. The usual suspects – poverty, social media impact, lack of rigour in some school curricula – these will all play a part in this complex issue.

But the correlation between school attendance and academic success is often overlooked.

Simply – if you turn up to school, every lesson, every day – you are much more likely to be academically (and socially) successful. Our MAGS data shows this as does our national school data.

We enjoy high levels of student attendance at MAGS – but we can still do better!

It's certainly not rocket science – being present matters.

The wealth of talent in Performing Arts, Visual Art and Media Studies was recognised and celebrated at the Arts Award Dinner held at Sorrento in the Park last Friday. Jorja Stevens and Josh Li (pictured below right) were named Girls Dux Artium and Boys Dux Artium respectively.

Jorja, an Arts Lion, was 2022 Arts Leader in Design, Media, and Theatresports and has 30 credits at excellence already in Arts subjects before externals this year. She has been Endorsed with Excellence in all NCEA Arts subjects at Level 1 and Level 2, and Drama Level 3 as a Year 12.

She has been a winner of awards at prizegiving in Arts each year since Year 9, and this year also won Best Sheilah Winn performer for Drama, Excellence in Design, and Excellence in Film-making.

Jorja has been an active participant in Theatresports, Sheilah Winn Shakespeare, the Musical Theatre group and many Visual Arts groups.

Josh Li is a two-time Arts Lion recipient, Arts Prefect, Music Leader, and co-leader of the Centennial Choir, which he has been a member of since its inception.



He has already achieved NCEA Level 3 with 30 credits at Excellence in Arts subjects prior to externals.

He has won awards in Music each year he has been at MAGS, and this year won awards for Service to the Choral programme and Outstanding Arts Service.

The awards evening, which was MC'ed by Albertian Tali Meavale, also saw several performances: Jackson Absolum-Leuluso'o, Manas Chigurukota, Isaac Chisholm, Isaiah Nin, Viliami 'Ofamo'oni and Nathan Setefano sang *End of the Road* (accompanied by Josh Li on keys); Eve Thompson performed a self-devised piece about Mary Queen of Scots, and Mr Watson and Bill Liu (pictured below) played a guitar piece, *Stella by Starlight*. Te Puna o Wairaka Dinner



Te Puna o Wairaka was finally able to celebrate its top students and send its Year 13 Leavers off in style at its awards dinner on Monday night after last year's event was held online due to Covid.

The awards dinner at Te Mahurehure Marae was MC'ed by Puna students Waimarie Tawera and Stuart Renata (pictured below), and featured Albertian Lincoln Savage as guest speaker.

Mr Savage, who worked as a high school teacher for many years, was introduced by HOF Te Puna o Wairaka Waimirirangi Paul, who had been one of his students.



He spoke on the theme of the whakataukī 'He manako te koura i kore ai' ('A crayfish won't jump in your net, just because you wish it in there'). He said hard work, determination and dedication at MAGS had helped him to become a Deputy Head Prefect, an athletics champion, a swimming champion and captain of the 1st XV. He had also helped to set up kapa haka at MAGS by approaching the Headmaster at the time – Greg Taylor – about the need for such a group and then following through when he got permission.

He said that whakataukī had served him

well throughout life, and it was one that Puna students could use as their mantra. When it came to the prizes, Aleisha Roulston won the Top Senior Academic Award, while Jackson Absolum-Leuluso'o was named All-Round Top Senior Student. Isaiah Nin won the "Manu Tute" Award For Services to Puna and the wider community, while Bree Tipene received the "He toka tū" Award For Contribution to Kapa Haka. Sasha Tobin was All-Round Top Junior Girl, and the All-Round Top Junior Boy was Jarom Rowell. The Top Junior Academic Award went to Kingston Ballantyne.

The award for Top Senior Māori Language Orator went to Hokioramai Dunn, and Awanui Hope was named Top Junior Māori Language Orator.

When it came to sports achievement, Gabreyl Tahitahi won the top junior award and Dani Ah Chee-Wilson the top senior award.

The ASB MAGS Farm – A Short Summary



The driving force behind the ASB MAGS Farm was the local Council of the New Zealand Institute of Horticulture, which wanted rural subjects taught in some school or other, preferably a specialised one.

Various manoeuvres involved the NZIH, the ASB, the Government, the Auckland Grammar School Board of Governors, the Headmaster and some minor punters. The upshot was that this School was in a serendipitous position. The last 20 acres of the Kerr-Taylor home farm was on the market, the land was contiguous with the School, it was the depth of the Great Depression, a School Farm was an idea whose time had come.

The Auckland Savings Bank purchased the land, the Grammar School Board leased it, and

we had access on 1 May 1933, a year after negotiations began.

Two acres were sub-leased to the DSIR for a Citrus Test Orchard of 116 trees. The School planted a mixed orchard of 72 trees. Seventy six boys were studying agriculture that first year.

Animals were introduced in 1934: a bull, six Jersey cows and three calves, an unspecified small number of sheep and pigs, horses for ploughing, and bees. A hive of activities. There was a series of part-time farm managers for the first 10 years. Then the position became full-time and has been ever since. The most significant, by a long stretch, was Ces Honeybun, 1956-1985, who set up the farm as a profitable concern with annually renovated pastures and pedigree studs of sheep and pigs. They won awards in Agricultural Shows year after year.

The farm is ever-changing; there is now a block of kiwifruit, a wetland planted in endemic trees and a thriving Horticultural Unit, harkening back to the original orchards and vegetables.
