Ethics Olympiad winners

Two teams of girls from 10AHN competed at the Auckland Middle School Ethics Olympiad on Tuesday, with one of them coming away the winners.

Nishera Gnanendra, Alex Barker, Tiara Chettiar, Emma Cook and Tabea Leonhardt formed one team while Naomi Emslie, Greeshma Kasuganti, Ella Sutton, Eva Wadsworth and Vivienne Wong formed the other.

The format of the competition is a reasoned ethical discussion rather than a debate. English teacher Erin Atchison said, "Both teams performed brilliantly in the heats and were in the running for the top spots. However, Nishera's team made it to the final two against a team from Diocesan and competed in the final, adjudicated by Professor Tim Dare from Auckland University Philosophy Department.

"The first case was on the subject of charity and wealth; the second on the use of device location tracking by parents on their children. Other teachers mentioned to me how well Nishera did today but, in the final, all five girls spoke in a thoughtful and considered way."

The Beths winners at music awards



Albertian and former MAGS music teacher Benjamin Sinclair (pictured right) won two New Zealand Music Awards last night along with another former MAGS music teacher Elizabeth Stokes as part of indie pop band The Beths.

They picked up two Tuis last night – for Best Group and Best Alternative Artist.

Mr Sinclair was an itinerant music teacher and Jazz Band director at MAGS, while Ms Stokes was a brass teacher before commitments with The Beths took over.

Following the release last year of their breakthrough debut album *Future Me Hates Me*, The Beths have been touring extensively – through Europe, the United States, Australia and Asia.

The Beths were nominated for five Tuis: Best Alternative Artist, Album of the Year, Single of the Year (*Little Death*), Best Group and Breakthrough Artist of the Year.

Last weekend saw 30 students go out to the Karangahake Gorge to complete their Bronze journey with Mr Belson, Miss Ripley and Mr Ploeg.

The weather was changeable as they tramped around, up and through the gorge and the

Karangahake Mountain.

The campsite at Dickey Flat is the perfect place to learn about camping, tramping and cooking with limited facilities – there was a lot of burnt pasta and porridge! The students learned how to navigate, manage their group, as well as themselves, and generally be prepared and safe in the outdoors.

Mr Belson said, "All the students were enthusiastic, committed and energetic and tackled their respective journeys in a positive manner. It was a great first introduction to basic bushcraft and tramping skills in preparation for the next level.

"They now need to ensure they complete the remaining three sections of the award before continuing on to Silver. They were all a credit to the school."

Motutapu restoration continues

The Environment Group has been part of the volunteer days to Motutapu Island for four years now, and even in that short space of time they have seen great progress made. The Motutapu Restoration Trust is coordinating the largest ecological restoration project in New Zealand and it is only 30 minutes from downtown Auckland.

Last Sunday, 10 students - mostly Year 9s - went planting in the wetlands.

Group Leader Helen Dunham said, "We planted 450 native trees, which will eventually be a home for threatened species in NZ. This contributes to the 10,000 trees already planted this year."

On the school front, the group has helped to get recycling bins placed around the grounds and is educating staff and students about recycling.

As a student, Mr Cave spent five years at MAGS before coming back to teach. His father attended MAGS from 1923, and Greg's two sons came to MAGS in the 1980s.

Mr Cave began at MAGS in 1974 as a teacher of Latin. During his time he taught French and Economics, and introduced Japanese as a subject in 1980.

He has been invaluable in his Academic Deaning role, supporting students as they prepare to transition to university and tertiary study.
