Back gate closure from Monday

The school was advised yesterday by a member of the Auckland Council that there has been a change of date to works to be carried out on the pedestrian bridge and culvert at the back of the school.

The council advises that this is to commence on Monday, November 26 (as opposed to their previous advice that work would begin on Monday, December 3) and that the pedestrian bridge will be closed.

As a result, there will be no access either in or out of the school via the back gate from Monday, November 26. The school has not been told how long this work will take. Students who usually enter and exit via this gate will need to factor this into their day, especially those who are still sitting NCEA examinations and who up until this point have been able to use this gate at the beginning of the day.

Students will need to use the boardwalk along the School House boundary and be aware of the extra time this will take.
