Brian Murphy's 60 years of service

Friends, colleagues and Albertians gathered in the F.W. Gamble Hall on Wednesday evening to celebrate Brian Murphy's 60 years of service to Mount Albert Grammar School. Mr Murphy started at MAGS as a Science and Biology teacher in 1960 and over the years he has taught Chemistry, been responsible for Junior Science, a teacher-librarian, and a school counsellor before becoming the school's Archivist in 1999 – a role he continues to this day.

During those years, he has served under five headmasters, beginning with Murray Nairn (1954-69). Four of those headmasters were present on the evening to celebrate Mr Murphy's 60 years of service: Maurice Hall (1970-1988), Greg Taylor (1988-2006), Dale Burden (2006-2015) and current Headmaster Patrick Drumm. Also in attendance were Board of Trustees Chairman Greg Moyle and MAGS Foundation Chairman Peter Thorp. Mr Murphy was presented with a Gold Lion lapel pin to recognise his dedication to the school, and unveiled a commemorative plaque that has been placed under a puriri tree planted in his honour outside the Student Centre.

Named Albertian of the Year in 2009 (his 50th year of service), Mr Murphy was the first recipient of this honour not to have attended MAGS – giving an indication of the esteem in which he is held.

Mr Drumm said that Mr Murphy had been an invaluable and enduring asset to the school having filled so many different roles with distinction. His contribution was being celebrated throughout the week, with Mr Murphy appearing at daily assemblies so students could hear about and appreciate his service. She said Cure Kids, a health research charity, gave her hope that Eva could live a full life and so she decided to give back by working for Cure Kids as well as helping Starship

Ms McLeod, who was was awarded a Local Hero award for her work in the community, said the greatest gift we had was being able to give, and we should all try to leave the world a better place. Students were awarded the Lions for services to the Performing Arts, Visual Arts, the Liibrary, Technology, Pasifika, School House, and the wider school community. They were presented by Headmaster Patrick Drumm and Ms McLeod.

"I didn't put my hand up for Macbeth because I thought there is no way I can learn my lines in such a short space of time so I read for the Three Witches and Lady Macduff," said Takunda. "With only one week to put the production together, we performed what we had put together at Pipitea Marae and then the Legislative Chamber of Parliament – it was an intense experience doing that along with 47 other talented actors and actresses from all over the country."

Takunda said she had made friends for life during the week, and realised that acting was her true passion. The experience also formed a part of her growing appreciation of Shakespeare.

"I never really enjoyed Shakespeare that much before but after doing Spoken Word performances I've kind of connected the dots."

At the Globe next year, the 24 members of the Youth Shakespeare Company will have two weeks to prepare the nominated Shakespeare play.

"It's such an exciting opportunity; when I got the call to say I was a going to London I was in disbelief."

Takunda plans to study a Bachelor of Law with Sociology next year at a yet-to-bedetermined university.

Sports update

Premier Boys Basketball third in NZ



The Premier Boys Basketball team had a dream run to end their season at the national championships, exceeding all expectations by claiming third place. The team started the tournament poorly, losing both their matches on the first day to Napier Boys' High and eventual champions, Saint Kentigern, making a top 8 placing highly unlikely. With everything on the line, a much better performance was needed. After a bruising encounter that went down to the wire, MAGS prevailed against Middleton Grange. This was followed up with wins against Nayland College and then Gisborne Boys' High to keep their playoff hopes alive.

The team had to win a tough repecharge match against Rotorua Boys' to make the top 8. Making up for a lacklustre display against Gisborne, MAGS played one of their best matches of the season, playing strong team defence and shooting an impressive 14 three-pointers to win.

Strong defensive efforts were again on



display in the quarterfinal match against Rangitoto College. Once again, MAGS wore down strong opposition in a huge upset victory to advance to the semifinals.

The rematch against Saint Kentigern went better than the first encounter, with strong defensive pressure from MAGS disrupting their offensive plans. The team played valiantly and pushed Saint Kentigern to the limit, eventually going down 54-59.

MAGS rebounded the next day to decisively beat Cashmere High 71-53 to end the tournament on a positive note. There was more good news when Nate Wilson (pictured above right) was named in the tournament team.

Short Course swimming success



MAGS Academy swimmers shone at the NZ Short Course Swimming Championships which were held at the Sir Owen Glenn Aquatic Centre during the recent school holidays. The meet format is run so that the swimmers race in age group finals in the morning sessions. The Open finals at night are contested among the top 30 swimmers based on fastest times from the morning sessions regardless of age. The top 10 fastest swimmers in NZ make the A Open finals. Top 11-20 are in the B final, and top 21-30 are in the C final.



Brearna Crawford (16yrs, pictured above) starred as she showed her amazing versatility to win 17 medals: 13 Gold, one Silver, 3 Bronze, and to take four Open titles, nine16yrs age group titles, one Open NZ Record (50m Fly), four NZ 16yrs Records, four Akl Open Records, and six Akl Age Groups Records.

Quin Walden (14yrs) won his first Short Course National gold medal in the 50m

Back in backing up his performances from the recent NZ Secondary School Championships. Quin also won three Silver Medals.

Amber George won Silver in the 50m Back at her first ever national event. Swimming Captain Vasilina Shipilova (pictured left) won her first ever NZSC medal with a Bronze in the 200IM. Hunter Dobson (14yrs) produced an outstanding swim to win a Bronze in the 200m Back.

Lacrosse Boys win Bronze for NZ



Lacrosse players Liam Baber, William Couldrey and Sam Nash represented New Zealand as part of a squad that won a Bronze medal in the Australian Lacrosse Association's annual under-15 national tournament, held in Adelaide during the first week of the school holidays. This is just the second time NZ has fielded an U15 boys rep squad since the sport came to our shores in 1884. The NZ boys team faced off against nine representative teams from across the Australian regions.

During the seven months leading up to the tournament, the MAGS boys, including Sam Tebbutt, who was in the wider squad, trained hard alongside players from Rosmini, AGS, Mt Roskill Grammar and Waikato. Liam (#27) and Will (#19) formed part of the strong NZ attack, which collectively scored 59 goals in NZ's six games. NZ co-captain Sam (#33) formed part of a rotating mobile midfield combination that grafted tirelessly in the Adelaide heat

In pool play, NZ won three of their four matches, and had the closest of losses during sudden death overtime against the infamous Southern Crosse outfit.

Having then been beaten in a high-quality semifinal by the eventual competition winners (Western Metro), the NZ lads brought a focussed determination to their Bronze place playoff; a re-match against Southern Crosse. Another nail-biting neck-and-neck tussle saw

the Kiwis earn a 9-7 victory. Third is the highest place that any NZ men's lacrosse team has achieved in an international competition during our history of the game.

The MAGS boys did their school and country proud, and have helped to pave opportunities for newcomers to the MAGS squad.

On that note, this term sees a new Auckland schools 6-a-side boys lacrosse competition to help grow the sport. The MAGS boys have started training on Wednesday afternoons from 3.30pm on the bottom fields at school. All newcomers are welcome to join in (gear is available to borrow during training).
