#### From the Headmaster

#### One of Our Own

Yesterday the school held a special service to re-establish the 'Peter Whitehead Memorial Tree' within our school.

Peter Whitehead was a Mount Albert local who attended MAGS in the late 1970s before completing a Computer Science Degree at Auckland University.

As a keen mountaineer he had an immense enjoyment of the outdoors but at the age of 21, both he and his climbing partner tragically lost their lives in a climbing accident on Mount Tutoko in the Milford Sound area.

This obviously devastated Peter's family and friends and sometime later they organised a memorial service for Peter that included the planting of a small kauri tree along the Roy Clements Treeway. A large rock with a plaque was also laid to mark the tree.

At some stage, both the tree and the rock disappeared from their original place. This added to the grief for Peter's family and friends who used to visit the memorial at times. But a while ago the rock was rediscovered in the stream and at the end of last year the school recovered the rock and plaque.

Yesterday morning, Peter's father along with former school friends, current prefects and MAGS staff (some of whom taught Peter) gathered to bless and re-dedicate a new Peter Whitehead Memorial Tree – a kowhai sitting in the centre of our school near E-Block.

The school is grateful to Peter's family for allowing us to re-establish his memorial – and in doing so keeping Peter's story alive in the hearts of MAGS students in the time to come.

#### Peter Whitehead Memorial Re-dedication

In a moving ceremony yesterday morning, a memorial to Albertian Peter Whitehead (1976-1979) was re-dedicated in the school grounds.

Peter was 21 when he died in a climbing accident on Mt Tutoko in Fiordland in 1985, and his body was never recovered.

To honour his memory, in 1986 a kauri was planted beside Meola Creek along the Roy Clements Treeway. Beneath the kauri, a plaque with the legend 'Peter Whitehead Memorial Tree' was embedded in concrete.

Some time later, the tree died and the plaque-embedded concrete disappeared – thought to have been dragged out by vandals and rolled into the creek.

When the plaque was rediscovered and MAGS learned of its significance, arrangements were made to have it re-dedicated in the school grounds.

That culminated in yesterday's ceremony with Peter Whitehead's family, friends and former teachers in attendance.

#### **Albertians Association Luncheon**



Yesterday's Albertian Luncheon, the second of the year, saw past students pack out School House for a special presentation by ASB MAGS Farm Experience Centre Manager Peter Brice (pictured above).

Mr Brice gave the assembled Albertians an idea of his rural background and outlined the vision for redeveloping the farm so that it became and educational and industry leader in the Agri-food and Fibre sector.

The \$12 million Experience Centre will be the centrepiece of the 8.1ha farm and give students and visitors a world-class experience and educational environment with classrooms, an exhibition space and a seminar area.

The experience centre will take up to 500 students a year and also demonstrate



the innovation, science and environmental best-practice used on farms across New Zealand to around 25,000 Auckland school students every year.

Opening proceedings, School House Director Geoff Moon (pictured above right) welcomed guests and gave them an idea of the ethos of School House. He pointed out some new additions – mounted photos on the wall of sporting greats such as Sir Peter Snell and Sir Bryan Williams – that were there to inspire boarders to have a go.

Headmaster Patrick Drumm said while sport played a big part at the school, it was just one piece of the larger picture as shown by events of the past week, which included Performing

Arts concerts by Juniors and Seniors, Calculus students winning the CalcEX challenge, and the re-dedication of the Peter Whitehead Memorial earlier that day.

#### Busy time for Year 13 Outdoor Ed



During the second half of Term 3, the Year 13 Outdoor Education class fine-tuned their mountain biking skills and fitness in preparation for the Day Night Thriller at the Cougar Mountain Bike Park in Tokoroa.

This is a 12-hour relay event, where teams attempt to accumulate the most laps of a 6km course. Student lap times were used as the final assessment task for a Performance Achievement Standard. A highlight for many was riding in the dark using a torch mounted to their helmet. Congratulations to Ned Kerr, the fastest in the class with an impressive ride, two minutes faster than the rest.

Following on from this, the class participated in a 48-Hour Solo experience. The objective of solo is to further develop an individual's self-awareness, self-esteem, self-confidence, personal responsibility and personal motivation. It was a test both mentally and emotionally, and helped each student further consider their own values and provide them with a time to set their own goals.

The experience helped them to learn how to reflect in order to devise strategies for lifelong well-being. Thank you to the Waller Family, who kindly allowed us to use their stunning farm at South Head, which gave the students extensive views over the Kaipara Harbour.

## Sailing off into the summer holidays



Since 2016, Mount Albert Grammar School has offered a multi-day sailing trip in December for Year 11s on Sir Peter Blake's round the world yacht Steinlager 2.

Depending on the weather, multi-day trips can take a group to the outer islands of the Hauraki Gulf, Great Barrier Island, Great Mercury Island, Poor Knights or up as far as the Bay of Islands. A multi-day trip will provide students with opportunities to strengthen skills in leadership, teamwork, communication, determination, courage, and respect. Due to the popularity of the trip, we are



now able to offer the opportunity for a second boat: Lion New Zealand. Students will get first-hand experience of the different aspects of sailing with each participant being allocated a role (Helmsman, Meteorologist, Navigator, Communications Officer, Engineer, Safety Manager, Switch Board Operator, Sail Trimmer, Tactician etc) allowing the group to work and communicate together to sail the vessel. Throughout the sailing journey participants will engage in all aspects of sailing and will learn skills such as: Passage planning and safe navigation of the vessel; Hoisting, setting and lowering of the sails; Helming the yacht; Food preparation and cooking for the crew; Care for the maritime environment.

Additional to sailing, activities such as tramping, mountain biking, kayaking, fishing, rafting and snorkelling can be incorporated.

The group will learn all about life on board a round the world yacht, cooking and eating in

the same way as our famous New Zealand sailors. The crew will share stories and experiences about Sir Peter Blake and his teams, and the history of the vessel they are sailing on.

The four-day trip is for Year 11 students only, takes place from Thursday, 13 December to Sunday, 16 December, and costs \$432 per student.

A new engine was being fitted to an A320, while on the ground, in an engine cradle, was the one being replaced. This allowed our students to see the systems and layout at close range.
