Centenary Events selling fast



Tickets are selling fast for our <u>Centenary Celebrations</u> during the week of September 25 to October 1 so get in quick if you want to attend any of the following events:



• Centenary Dinner (Saturday, October 1, 6.30pm, Grand Millennium Hotel).

The culmination of our Centenary Celebrations week will feature a three-course dinner, drinks and entertainment.

The event will be MC'ed by Albertian broadcaster Mark Watson and feature a Headmasters' Q&A session, as well as three guest speakers: Albertian rugby legend Sir Bryan Williams, Albertian high-flying academic Molly Swanson, and our Academic Dean Warwick Gibbs, who has taught at MAGS for 50 years and was named Albertian of the Year 2021.

Guests will also be able to order <u>Centenary merchandise</u>, and buy the Centenary Book, *Change and Tradition*, which covers the past 25 years at MAGS and is a companion to MAGS' 75th Jubilee book, *Tradition and Change*.

• Centenary Reunion Drinks (Friday, September 30, 6pm, F.W. Gamble Hall). This informal gathering over food and drinks is a time for Albertians to catch up or reconnect.

There will be food on shared platters, a cash bar, a DJ on the night, and guests will be able to view class, sports and school photos from their time at MAGS. A photographer will be available to take photos of the reunions of classmates and friend groups.

 Albertians' Day and Luncheon (Wednesday, September 28, at MAGS). This day begins at 9.00am with a School Tour, followed by a Centenary Tree planting conducted by one of our oldest Albertians, Professor Russell Stone (the co-author of MAGS' 75th Jubilee book *Tradition and Change*) and one of our youngest students. Following this ceremony, there will be a special assembly with a guest speaker before adjourning for the Albertians Luncheon (for Old Old Boys and past staff) in the W.O.H. Gibbs Room. Make sure you bring along some \$5 notes for the raffle. Guests will also be able to buy the newly released Centenary Book, *Change and Tradition*.

• The Centenary Thanksgiving Service (Sunday, September 25,



10am, FW Gamble Hall) kicks off the week, with Caleb Faleolo as MC and the guest speaker being Thomas Wynne on "Through Hardship to Glory". The one-hour service will feature musical pieces by Matatumua Opeloge Ah Sam and our school choirs, with refreshments served at the end.

- Centenary Golf Day (Thursday, September 29, 11am, Muriwai Golf Club). There are limited slots available for this event, which will be an Ambrose competition with a shotgun start – and a social function and prizegiving afterwards at the Muriwai Golf Club.

Secondary teacher training 2023

Mount Albert Grammar School is one of 22 Auckland schools involved in the Auckland Secondary School Teaching Training Programme that is run in conjunction with University of Waikato.

This programme offers the opportunity to train as a secondary school teacher within a secondary school environment, while completing the Post Graduate Diploma in Teaching online. 2023 sees this programme in its third year of operation.

Trainees accepted into this programme spend a full year working on site at MAGS, completing their Post Graduate Diploma in Teaching online with the University of Waikato. The programme provides the opportunity for trainees to be paired with a subject specific mentor and work alongside them in a both a senior and junior class. There is an expectation that trainees will also choose to be involved in the co-

curricular programmes within the school: for example, those in the arts, sports or service pillars.

During the year, trainees will also have the opportunity to participate in a three-week professional experience (practicum equivalent) at one of the other Auckland schools in the programme. Plus, there are also 12 professional development days hosted across the other Auckland schools involved.

MAGS will meet the costs associated with the Post Graduate Diploma in Teaching and pay a stipend, currently \$10,000, for the year.

We are specifically interested in those who wish to train as Mathematics, Physics, Technology and Te Reo Māori teachers. However, applications from other subject areas are also welcome.

Sports Update

Winter Tournament Week wrap-up



With there being no Winter Tournament Week action for three years, it was great to see so many MAGS teams across various codes playing tournaments around the country.

Our Basketball Boys Premiers and Juniors finished 6th and 7th respectively while the Girls finished sixth in the Premiers and third in the Juniors. In Fencing, our MAGS Boys Epee A team (pictured right) of Sam Taylor Sinclair, QiQliDeng and Oliver Tang was third at NZSS.

Our Football Boys 1st XI was sixth at their NZSS tournament in Napier, while our Hockey Boys and Girls 1st XIs finished 7th and 4th respectively at their NZSS competitions in Hamilton and Palmerston North.

The Lacrosse Girls Premiers played NZSS at Cambridge, finishing 6th. A strong start from our Netball Premiers



saw them win five from five at UNISS but they couldn't maintain that form, eventually finishing seventh and just missing out on Nationals.

At NZSS in Rotorua, the Rugby League 1st XIII started out with a win but that momentum was stopped by some tough opposition to see them finish seventh.

Our Rugby Boys U15 travelled to Christchurch for their national tournament, coming up against some strong rugby schools and finishing 12th.

Our Senior Open Underwater Hockey team travelled to Wellington for NZSS, and finished 5th.
