It takes real courage to stand on stage in front of an audience armed solely with your voice as an instrument. There is nowhere to hide, nowhere to run.

Individually, each of our chorists possess their own unique singing voice - a solo instrument they carry with them at all times. But it

is when they join together as a choir that something quite magical happens. Each group member has a part to play - to bring their voice to the team. In doing so the product transcends what one may expect from simply joining these individuals together. And that is the power of the group – a community working hard and working together to produce something extraordinary.

As human beings we are designed to be creative and expressive – and it is usually much more fun when you are able to work in groups and teams to achieve this. Success at any endeavour is rarely a chance event – something of which our choirs are well aware. Vision, leadership and expertise combined with hours of disciplined practice are the precursors to any pursuit of excellence.

Our head choristers Violani Afoa and Kairo Ah Kuoi-Simich pictured on the front cover - have led their teams with passion. Highly accomplished chorists in their own right, they have worked hard and with purpose, focussing on creating succession for our choir programme through encouraging and supporting the next generation of MAGS singers.

And, as always in the case of a school, the success of our students is a function of the dedication and expertise of the adults to whom they look for leadership and guidance. Our choir directors Catherine Oxenham and Terence Maskell exemplify this, each creating environments in which our choral students can thrive. Further support from Academic Dean Warwick Gibbs, and Te Puna's Matua Peter Walters has allowed the finishing touches to be added to recitals.

I would also like to express appreciation for the generosity and financial support of the Black and White Golfers' Trust, that has ensured our choirs look as good as they sound! Thank you to the trustees and to all in our community who have lent their support this year.

Finally, thank you to our chorists and all MAGS performing artists who continue to lift our Arts Pillar to new heights! Thank you for adding the soul to our school!

Our Gloriana and Centennial choirs have come a long way in a very short space of time

Both represented MAGS at the Auckland Big Sing competition held at Auckland Town Hall in June, with the Centennial Choir being selected to compete at the Finale against the top choirs from around the country.

The Centennial Choir also received 'Commendable Performance' awards for repertoire and a cappella performance.

It's been a rapid rise for a choir that was founded In 2019, when Terence Maskell was appointed as an Itinerant Choral Specialist, charged with providing a platform for choral music performance at MAGS – initially with boys only, but with a view to expanding to the establishment of a mixed-voice choir as well.

In September 2019, a fledgling boys' choir took to the stage in the F.W. Gamble Memorial Hall to sing a couple of simple pieces. The choir was guest artist at a concert put on by The Graduate Choir NZ and was warmly received at this, their first major public appearance.

Spearheaded in December 2019 by a "singing assembly" for the 2020 Prefect cohort, a result of which saw many of the senior boys wishing to be part of the boys' choir, the thrust to continue boys' singing continued into 2020 and beyond. The choir

began to take a more active role in school activities – singing in assemblies, at Anzac Commemorations, school concerts and other events.

In 2021, the boys' choir (which had by then been named The Centennial Choir, to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the school in 2022) was robust and skilled enough to take part in the Auckland Regional Competition of The Big Sing. As a result of its performances – where it picked up no fewer than four local awards – was selected to take part in the Finale in Christchurch in August of that year, as one of 24 top secondary school choirs in the country. This was a coup for the choristers and the school – but their hopes were only to be dashed by the disheartening cancellation of the Finale due to Covid-19.

Mr Maskell said, "Undaunted, however, a resilient and indefatigable group of boys soon rallied to try again in 2022 – this time not quite making the Finale selection but instead was invited to compete in the second-tier finale, Cadenza, in Rotorua – where it won a Gold Award."

This year the choir is preparing five pieces to be presented in two recitals over three days in Auckland at the end of August as part of The Big Sing Finale.

Mr Maskell said, "The Big Sing Finale is a remarkable event in the national music calendar, showcasing outstanding choral performances by choirs - mixed-voice,

girls, boys – that are the envy of overseas adjudicators and visitors. Every recital by each competing choir is recorded for later broadcast on RNZ Concert.

"As this goes to print, The Centennial Choir, which acknowledges with gratitude the huge support it receives from the Headmaster, Patrick Drumm, has come a long way in a very short time. Credit belongs to the boys who commit fully to the work of the choir and who give of their time and talent – gaining life-long skills along the way."

Gloriana was founded in 2021 and under Choir Director Catherine Oxenham has maintained a steady roll of 30 keen singers.

Its membership spans years 9 to 13 and they have been impressively led in 2023 by Violani Afoa as Head Chorister and Emily Gough as Deputy Head Chorister.

Mrs Oxenham gratefully enlisted the assistance of MAGS' Academic Dean Warwick Gibbs as rehearsal pianist and accompanist this year.

In 2023, Gloriana also had the privilege of working alongside Matua Peter Walters and arranging a waiata Māori as part of their repertoire for The Big Sing.

Mrs Oxenham said, "It has been a rich learning experience for us all and joyful performances of *Ka Pioioi* (by Kereopa Rātapu) have been enthusiastically received.

"The choir's performance at The Big Sing – which included *Ka Pioioi, Home* by Jay Althouse, and *Muusika* by Pärt Uusberg – was confident, secure and the product of considerable hard work. The group's growth and capability in 2023 has been extraordinary and the choir is really beginning to 'find their voice'. In addition to increased musical capability, the choir continues to be a supportive, positive learning opportunity. The way the choristers look out for each other, organise additional rehearsals and draw together as a team is impressive.

"They are an outstanding group and it is a privilege to be part of their music making."





Gloriana is three years old, and Mrs Oxeham has been part of its story from the beginning.

"I began as a volunteer rehearsal pianist in 2020, moving through from Associate Director to sole Director in 2023," she said.

"My personal engagement with music has been lifelong but was not a career choice. I trained and worked for 20 years as an Occupational Therapist both in New Zealand and overseas.

"In 2013 I decided to re-engage with music and in 2018 completed an ATCL in Performance (piano). This was alongside convening regional music competitions, working for Trinity College, writing grant applications for community-based arts groups and working/ training alongside the Everybody Sings/All Together Now group of choirs.

"I am currently a conducting trainee with the New Zealand Children's Choral Academy under Dr Karen Grylls CNZM and preparing to sit an ATCL in Performance (singing)

"My skills as a group facilitator and experience working with diverse groups of people have enabled me to deliver my values of inclusion and service via supportive, high quality choral music experiences. These are the values I bring to Gloriana."

Mr Maskell (BA DipMus DipTchg), has been the conductor of The Graduate Choir, NZ since its inception in 2001.

He was formerly Director of Music at Aorere College for 20 years, establishing a firm national and international reputation for fine choral groups there. For over nine years he was the conductor of the Auckland Youth Choir, a group which won numerous

international awards under his direction.

Mr Maskell's choirs have performed regularly on television and radio, toured in NZ and overseas, and he has acted as guest conductor, accompanist (piano and organ), soloist (countertenor), adjudicator, choral arranger and clinician on numerous occasions.

Mr Maskell says of The Centennial Choir, "Some of the boys have already progressed with growing musical and vocal maturity into other top choirs in the country – e.g.

The Graduate Choir NZ, the NZ Secondary Schools Choir.

ALBERTIANS — IN THE ARTS

OLI MATHIESEN

Freelance dancer and choreographer Oli Mathiesen (Ngāpuhi, Ngāti Hine, Ngāti Manu) is sustaining and loving a career in the arts.

Oli graduated from MAGS in 2017 as Boys Dux Artium, performing in the plethora of curriculum and external opportunities MAGS Arts provides. He took media studies and photography in his final years to support his developing artistic practice and eagerness to pursue the arts. Oli then went on to complete a Bachelor of Performing and Screen Arts majoring in Contemporary Dance at Unitee's dance program, graduating in 2020.

At the completion of his studies, Oli was offered an internship at Atamira Dance Company, the leading Māori theatre dance maker in Aotearoa. The following year he was offered a contract with the company to perform in their 21st year celebration legacy work

Te Wheke premiered at the ASB Waterfront Theatre in July 2021, and was a reflection of the company's kaupapa and body of work which spanned from its founding in 2000. The premiere of Te Wheke was followed by a national tour, travelling to Wellington and Christchurch, and since then to Whangārei and Dunedin. The beginning of 2023 saw the company travel to the United States of America to complete their first international tour of Te Wheke. Oli has continued working with Atamira since, engaging in wānanga and developments, and recently returning



to Unitec to guest lecture their Haka Toi Aotearoa class. Last year Oli choreographed the development season *KAHA – Tripleboost.*

In October 2022, Oli performed for, the New Zealand Dance Company (NZDC) in their new show *What They Said*.

Prior to What They Said, Oli and his choreographic partner, Sharvon Mortimer, undertook the second development of their debut work Night and Mortar, a physical theatre and contemporary duet performed by the duo, exploring the drama, tragedy, crime, and allure of Film Noir through avantgarde aesthetics and obscured characters. They premiered their show in December in various bars and cinemas across Auckland, with their pop-up performances emerging from the social atmospheres for the unsuspecting patrons. The season met with great success, and Oli and Sharvon look to tour their work nationally and internationally in 2024.

Earlier this year Oli travelled to Perth, Australia to rehearse and perform in worldrenowned Canadian choreographer Crystal Pite's 10 Duets on a Theme of Rescue.

2022 saw the premiere of Oli's movement and set installation *Divine Estate* in The Performance Arcade 2022; an installation of shipping containers on Wellington's waterfront where artists are welcome to install, perform, and transform these steel structures into works of art. Oli installed a metre-high ceiling into his container; an engineering challenge and his first attempt at set design. Later that year Oli was successfully selected to complete a monthlong residency at Movement Art Practice (MAP) in Christchurch. The exchange allowed Oli to deep dive into his research *Full Digital Upload* which looks at augmented reality, virtual reality, photo, and video technologies in relation to the body. Oli will be presenting his findings at Studio One Toi Tu in an exhibition in 2024

Oli is currently in rehearsal with Black Grace Dance Company for the premiere of their developmental cast in I Am A Renaissance at the Herald Theatre, and will later in the year be performing in Limbs Dance Company's founding member Mary Jane O'Reilly's Ballet Noir. He will also be embarking on the development of his next choreographic work The Butterfly Who Flew Into the Rave with his dance collaborators Sharvon Mortimer and fellow MAGS graduate Lucy Lynch, set to premiere in Auckland Pride Festival 2024.

The event, MC'ed by Head Prefects Olivia Bennett and Taiarahia Moataane-Mika, was attended by Year 13s and saw the presentation of Scholar Lions to our top academic achievers of Year 12 and Year 13

2022, as well as recognition of those who excelled in Scholarship.

Citations were read by Academic Dean Warwick Gibbs for the 15 students who earned three or more Scholarships and whose names will go up on our Honours Board.

Guest of honour was Brian McMath, who presented the June Gray Scholarship to Vivienne Hei Man Wong.

There was also a musical performance, with Violani Afoa wowing the audience with her rendition of the Randy Newman song *Almost There*, accompanied by Celestine Howard on piano.

Among the students who delivered some of our best 2022 Scholarship results were our 2022 Girls Dux Deboprana Mallick, who won a Premier Award, and 2022 Boys Dux Wesley Donald, who was named an Outstanding Scholar along with Yujia Karen Zheng.



They were among 15 MAGS students who gained Scholarship Awards – worth \$2000 each year for up to three years. In total,

MAGS students gained 118 Scholarships with 15 of those at Outstanding level, placing MAGS fourth in NZ.

Deboprana's Premier Award places her among the top 11 scholars in the country and is worth \$10,000 a year for up to three years of tertiary study.


She earned Outstanding Scholarships in Calculus, Earth and Space Science and Economics; and Scholarships in Chemistry, English, Physics and Statistics.

HOF Māori Waimirirangi Paul said, "The final two weeks of Term 1 were very busy and exciting. In week 9, we performed at the school Unity Concert at the Dorothy Winstone Centre, Auckland Girls Grammar. Although this year's event was doubled over two days, we were only able to open the concert with a performance on the first night, due to our Polyfest preparations. In the end, it was a successful ngahau, we were grateful to be able to tautoko the other cultural groups of the school and it was yet another awesome experience for our students of the kapa."

She added, "In the final week of the term, the kapa took to the stage to perform at this year's Polyfest on the Māori Stage at the Due Drop Events Centre in Manukau. For the first time in over a decade, our kapa drew the second-to-last spot to perform in Division 1, which

meant that we didn't have to wake up before dawn to get ready, as was the case last year.

"Our students made us extremely proud with a riveting performance, led by our kaitātaki tāne (male leader/Year 13 Prefect) – Hokioramai Dunn – and our kaitātaki wahine (female leader/Year 13 student) – Libby Johnson. There was a great turnout of kaitautoko (supporters), ranging from whānau members, MAGS (particularly Puna), alumni and staff.

"At the conclusion of prize giving, we came away with three awards: 1st place for 'Best male kākahu' (costume), 1st place for 'Best female kākahu' (costume) – both of which are first time awards for our kapa/school, as well as 'Most improved' kapa of the division.

"Overall, we placed 6th out of 14 kapa haka and were only five points away from 5th place."







Ngā Manu Kōrero

Awanui placed 3rd overall for the Pei Te Hurinui – Senior Māori section, Ben placed 7th overall in the Korimako – Senior English section, and Lily placed 4th overall in the Rāwhiti Ihaka – Junior Māori section.

HOF Māori Waimirirangi Paul said, "We are extremely proud of our ākonga and look forward to supporting Katie as much as possible in the lead-up to nationals later this year."

She has been instrumental in the development of the junior and senior Health programme at MAGS and was a Dean for a number of years. She is also currently involved in work for the Ministry of Education in Health.

With a passion for health and wellbeing and an understanding of the importance of a whole school approach, Ms Lythe looks forward to using her knowledge to support the pastoral care team.

He is the most capped player in touch rugby, representing New Zealand in nine World Cups and winning three. He has been a member of 35 winning national championship teams, with 20 consecutive gold medals for Auckland.

He received the Coach of the Year award at the Māori Sports Awards in 1999 and the Tohu Motuhake in 2011. Mr Walters received a Lifetime Achievement Award from Touch New Zealand in 2019.

PHYSICS

Vibhaa Sharma is the first MAGS student to make it into the New Zealand team to compete in the world's most prestigious experimental Physics competition, the International Young Physicists Tournament.

This competition requires students to carry out original investigative work on some challenging and interesting subjects and then, like a Masters or PhD student, present their findings to a panel of judges that includes university professors and leaders in industry.

The panel rigorously questions the competitors on their experimental processes and conclusions.

Vibhaa's research involved investigating physical parameters that determine the fascinating fractal patterns seen in nature; in particular the patterns formed when ink is added to white paint.



Our MAGS Relay for Life team has raised more than \$48,000 for the Cancer Society and won the Gold Fundraising Award for top fundraising group.


The professors took a close interest in teaching and classwork, taking photos and making copious notes as the teacher and students interacted

In Term 3, MAGS hosted three one-week visits by groups of Chinese students as a way of showcasing our school culture and the Kiwi experience.



During the last week of Term 1, four of our students took part in the International Maths Modelling Challenge – and their solution has been judged as one of the top two entries from New Zealand.

That means that Year 13 student Anatol Coen, Year 12s Jacob Miller and Ryan Shen, and Year 11 Victor Coen moved forward to be judged internationally against the best entries submitted from across the world.

The problem they worked on for five days straight was to come up with mathematical models to determine the best use for a specific plot of land in the vicinity of New York that factored in variables such as "geography, climate, business options, community needs and local culture".





Our 13 Outdoor Education class participated in an overnight Surf Camp at Tawharanui Regional Park in early March.

This provided them with the first significant opportunity of the year to focus on developing their transferable skills through the outdoors, notably independence.

When surfing, the class was instructed by Rapu Adventures instructors with a focus on surf awareness and technique. Then in camp, each student had to set up their tent and cook for themselves.

Then, across a fortnight in March, our 10 Outdoor Education classes visited Piha as the culmination of classroom and pool lessons related to surf awareness and surfing.

Head of Outdoor Education Darren Whitehead said, "It was awesome to see all of the manaakitanga being shown towards each other, the environment, equipment and instructors."

In late March, the 13 Outdoor Education class travelled south to canoe the Whanganui River.

Entering the river at Whakahoro, they spent four days paddling to Pipiriki. The highlights included the stunning scenery and settled weather, visiting the Bridge to Nowhere, unexpected capsizes and developing friendships.

Mr Whitehead said, "This trip provided students with an amazing opportunity to practise their transferrable skills and focus on safety

management issues and strategies.

"Our students excelled at making considered decisions related to their self-management, choice of equipment and menu."

In Term 2, our Year 10 Outdoor Education students have used kayaking to develop their Positivity.

Weekly lessons in the pool allowed students to become familiar with wet exiting and rescues before each class visited Wero Whitewater Park in Manukau.

Mr Whitehead said, "Not letting their nerves or negative chatter get the better of them, our students used the strategies they developed in class effectively and should feel proud that they paddled the Grade Two river by themselves."

This award supports and encourages Pasifika students to pursue an interest and career in the Sciences, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths (STEAM). They also receive wrap-around support during their year of study.

Our Pasifika Health Science Programme, led by Dr Carolyn Haslam with after-school tutorials run by Ms Walker and Ms Pulham, has been crucial in raising Pasifika achievement in the Sciences and cementing much-improved participation and sound results in NCEA Sciences.

Samoan Language Week

MAGS celebrated Vaiaso o le Gagana Samoa (Samoan Language Week) in May/June with various events, including a cultural dress day, performances, and a Staff v Students volleyball game.

The theme this year was 'Be proud of your language and grounded in your identity'.





The Year 12 and 13 Pasifika Health Science Academy FONO was held in March in the staffroom.

The event was attended by around 80 parents and students. The information on student participation and achievement in science was well received. The Pasifika Health Science Academy students are outperforming the other Pasifika students at MAGS in science in both participation and achievement in NCEA.

HOD Careers Kerrin Hanson spoke about scholarships and Health Career opportunities at tertiary level, and Taiarahia Moataane-Mika spoke of the benefits of being in the Pasifika Health Science Academy.

The students were also presented with their badges by Aaror Lui from the Counties Manukau DHB.



Our Pasifika Initiatives team ran three information evenings in early March for our Pasifika parents and students.

The Pasifika Leadership team for this year was formally introduced and acknowledged, including Head Prefect Taiarahia Moataane-Mika, and executive prefects Andrew Samuels, Kairo Ah Kuoi-Simich and Kaloni Tovo, as well as our other Pasifika prefects including Josie Gaoa, Keera Ieriko, Violani Afoa, Angie Lolohea, Leila Belt, Tito Tipi, Kalani Ah Su'e, Isaiah Fale and Ikaika Hanks-Papali'i.

Parents were provided with information about new teachers relevant to Pasifika students, BOT representatives, and the Komiti Faufautua, which has the theme of "Leadership Growing Leadership".

There were presentations about NCEA results, the Pasifika Health Science Academy (HSA) programme and Science Tutorials, academic tracking for all senior Pasifika students, and overviews of current programmes and courses offered to students.



SCIENCE

The Wāhine in Physics Club (WIP) is the brainchild of Year 13 student Isla McLeay and promotes physics as a career pathway to girls at MAGS.

Isla says, "Currently the Level 3 physics roll is 26% female and Level 2 is 28%.
Personally, I am one of five girls in my physics class of 26 people. We are aiming to increase these numbers through educating younger students about opportunities in physics (e.g. careers, competitions), and show how important and fun physics can be through immersive activities."

So far this year, WIP has established a lunchtime homework club, where students

can find help with their questions regarding science work, and have also worked with the Woman in Engineering Network from University of Auckland to hold in-school activity/Q&A sessions for students wanting to learn more about engineering.

Isla runs a homework group on Tuesday at lunchtime in CS6 and the club on Wednesday at lunchtime for activities.

A workshop with the Woman in Engineering Network challenged students to design a pipe network that fills three water tanks at the same rate, and to design a product that enables the user to have delicious dessert with minimal effort.

SOCIAL SCIENCI

More than 100 Level 2 Geography students enjoyed fine weather on a field trip on May 26 to the Puhoi River to collect primary data.

Students were investigating spatial variation of river landforms and processes. Students also observed the effects of major flooding, which had occurred two weeks earlier.

HOD Geography Mr Haines said, "These students gained new insights into how rivers behave. River environments are found across our country and, as the occurrence of climate events increases, it's vital young people have knowledge and understanding of these types of places."



Year 12 Social Science students visited three locations across Tāmaki Makaurau (Lower Queen Street, Ellerslie and Papatoetoe) on May 25 with the aim of gathering field data to prove that the shape, size and purpose of these areas are different to one another.

The fieldwork collection involved surveying members of the public, taking photographs, analysing shop types, making observation notes and taking pedestrian counts.

This data will now be presented and conclusions made back in class as part of an internal assessment.

Social Studies and Geography Teacher Mr Hobbs said, "The students/ākonga on this trip were a credit to MAGS as they represented the school with pride in these areas and on the train. Examples of this were when ākonga frequently gave their seats up for elderly or less mobile people entering the trains and the respect shown to members of the public when approached for surveys.

"Overall, it was a successful day out with fantastic weather."










Pride CZ Prejudice

The majority of our School Athletics Championships was held on February 22 at Lovelock Track, with the 100m finals held at school during lunchtime in front of a large crowd.

Several school records were broken during the meet. Jirah Esekia (Year 11) broke the school record he equalled last year at the New Zealand Secondary Schools Nationals in the Intermediate Boys Shot Put with an even more impressive throw of 14.91m.

Peggy Taylor (Year 10) ran an impressive 400m time to set a new school record of 1:00.87 in the junior girls section. Nina Chalmers (Year 11) broke the Intermediate Girls 1500m record by a staggering 16 seconds with a time of 4:51.38, continuing the high standards she set last year.

Other highlights included a competitive Intermediate Boys High Jump where Hawaiki Goodwin (Year 10) won with a jump of 1.75m. Hokioramai Dunn (Year 13) impressed, winning both the shotput and discus in the senior boys category.

Taya Lewis (Year 13) also won the shotput and discus in the senior girls category. Elliot Kitchener (Year 13) won the 100m, 200m and 400m senior boys category.

CENTRAL/WEST/EAST ZONE ATHLETICS

Forty eight students represented MAGS at the Central/West/East Zone Athletics meet. Peggy Taylor finished 2nd in both the Junior Girls 200m and 300m. Kendra Scally-Tui finished 3rd in both the Intermediate Girls 100m and 200m. Maddie Earley showed her promise as a track and jumps athlete, finishing 2nd in the Junior Girls 70m and 1st in the Triple Jump. Our Junior Girls 4 x 100m Relay also won. MAGS students also showed their ability in the throwing events. This included a 2nd

The Auckland Secondary School Athletics Championships on April 5 at Waitakere Stadium saw several students finishing in podium places and school records being broken.

The Junior Girls 4 x 100m Relay team won gold with a time of 52.81, breaking the school record set in 2021.

Peggy Taylor again showed her promise

Taya Lewis showed her promise as a thrower, finishing 2nd in the Senior Girls Javelin, 3rd in the Discus, and narrowly missed a medal in the Shotput. Anika Todd finished second in the Senior Girls High Jump and finished 4th in the Javelin.

Albertian Lily Brislen, captain of the MAGS archery team in 2022, won gold

in the Under 21 Women's Target, bronze in the Open Women's Matchplay, and the Junior Women's Target trophy for the year.

Two MAGS archers and one Albertian were part of the New Zealand youth archery team that won the Trans Tasman Challenge in Adelaide over the April school holidays.

Nick Lees, Year 13, Phoebe Newcombe, Year 11, and Lily Brislen joined 14 other youth archers from across New Zealand in the four-day tournament against Australia in the Adelaide Hills.

Despite being the coldest Easter Adelaide had seen in 30 years, the New Zealand team overcame the weather to triumph with 70 points to Australia's 50.

AQUATHON

The Auckland Secondary Schools Aquathon took place on March 22 at Saint Kentigern College with 11 students (three teams and five individuals) representing MAGS.

The Aquathon consists of a swim leg followed by a run leg. We had a mix of students who have competed in this event in previous years as well as some newcomers.

Our students competed well throughout the various age categories, and we gained several credible results.

MAGS Fencers also recorded some great results at the National Age Group Championships held in Auckland in late April at St Kentigern College.

Emi Mason won gold in the U17 Girls Epee Teams, representing Fencing North A, and QiQi Deng, representing Fencing North A, won silver in the U17 Boys Epee Teams.

MAGS Fencing entered 11 fencers into the Fencing North Island Secondary Schools individual event in June, with over 100 fencers attending from 30 schools at West Auckland's Te Pai Courts.

It was a tough day for the girl fencers, who all made it to the last 16 but struggled to break into the top eight. Emi Mason was very strong in the initial round, winning four out of her five matches, but came up against an opponent with a good game plan.

Four boys reached the top eight with outstanding performances.

Nico Meyer (2nd) stopped a big comeback to beat team-mate Elijah Yarr (3rd) in a very close match. Elijah finished the first round top seed with six wins, the only fencer to achieve that. However, Nico was mentally sharp and had a good psychological battle to take the honours.

Thomas Pham (5th) and QiQi Deng (7th) both made the top eight, rounding out a good event for the boys.

Over five weeks in February and March, MAGS Orienteers excelled in the School Sprints Series, winning five of the six grades and 14 of the 18 podium positions racing at Waitakere College, Avondale College, Rutherford College, Green Bay High and Henderson High.















Climbing



A girls team joined with the MAGS boys to enter the Mixed W12 race. MAGS won its heat and went straight to the Championship semifinals where they showed real determination to place in the top 3.

Marnie Toloa competed in the W1 category, qualifying for the final where she had a quick start and the strength and fitness to hold off the chasers and win the gold medal, the first medal winner for MAGS at a waka ama nationals event.

Following his sister, Marlin Toloa entered the boys W1 J19 event, as an U16 paddler, to challenge himself. Marlin also made his final and had an explosive start. He maintained his composure and canoe speed to hold off a very fast field to take the gold.

It is believed to be the first time siblings have held current National

There were some great results for MAGS across various sports during Summer Tournament Week

A strong season of rowing finished with three podium finishes for MAGS at the 2023 Maadi Regatta, the national championships for school rowing.

The Maadi Regatta was held at Lake Karapiro, and the MAGSROW squad won medals in three U17 pair events in the space of less than 30 minutes.

Lily Curnow and Olivia Tattersfield were the first to take home a medal, winning bronze in the Girls U17 Coxless Pair Oars.

Around 10 minutes later Fraser MacGillivray and Luke Sanders won silver in the Boys U17 Coxless Pair Oars event, while their teammates Max Jarvie and Ethan Green won bronze in the same event.

Olivia Tattersfield also narrowly missed out on a medal in the Girls U16 Single Sculls, crossing the finish line in fourth place by a margin of 1.2 seconds.

The Futsal Junior Girls placed second, losing out 3-1 to Mt Maunganui in a close game. The Futsal Senior Girls placed fourth after a tight 2-1 loss to Queen Margaret College.

The Futsal Senior Boys finished eighth after beating Hamilton Boys High 3-0.

Basketball Nationals MAGS entered teams



















Lots has been happening around the farm. We have sold the dairy cows and, in their place, purchased high genetic merit milking sheep. We have pedigree east Friesian rams who were embryos imported from the Netherlands and who, as adults, have themselves exported genetic material around the world. We have registered as an East Friesian Stud under the prefix MAGSLAND and you will see some of our stock at both Kumeu and the Royal Easter shows. The NZ Sheep Breeders Association are putting together a youth incentive scheme to encourage our students to get involved and this will also involve competitions and other extra-curricular activities. The association has also waived all registration fees for our stock and membership fees.

The old storeroom area in the dairy shed has been cleaned out and repurposed into a laboratory where we will be able to collect, freeze and store genetic material from our rams for both future use and for outside sale. This is an amazing concept as we compare the value of dealing in genetics. For example, if we build up to 30 pedigree Ewes, we will

potentially have around 30 stud rams to sell each year at a value of \$1,000 to \$1,500. However, by selling genetic material we can add further income as per straw price for top rams is \$85-plus.

New yards have been put in and lots of clean up and painting has been done. Thanks to The Foundation, three-quarters of the farm has a brand-new boundary fence and we will shortly have beautiful Carex grasses being planted.

The Calves being reared now are Belgian Blue and our autumn calves are growing extremely well.

We have only kept a few calves over Autumn to ensure we have our rearing system sorted before venturing into larger numbers in the spring. The calf rearing area has been spruced up, with just a little more work needed to have it at full efficiency.

We have developed a new poultry area which should see triple the current egg production along with sales of hens, and students are taking chicks from 1 day old through to layers. We will have around 50 layers this season compared to 17 in the past.

Looking towards lambing season in spring with our Suffolk ewes due to lamb around July/august and our milking sheep in October. The milking lambs will be the first to be registered under the new MAGSLAND prefix!

Workshop and sheds have all been cleaned up and organised and so far, two skips have been filled from the horticulture block as Melena and the team have been doing an amazing job of cleaning up, pruning and bringing new life to Horticulture! Watch this space as we develop the Horticulture area into something we can really be proud of and bring the connection between Agriculture and Horticulture closer together.

This year is very much a learning curve for us all as we feel our way through to making the farm more efficient and effective. We are working towards a fantastic Ag and Hort facility we can all be proud of and producing top students that primary industry players and educators value highly.

In 2016, after four years teaching in Australia, she came home to New Zealand. She taught both Agriculture and



Agribusiness, and managed Rathkeale College's 8.1ha farm in the Wairarapa for seven years, and was part of the Future Beef NZ Committee from 2019 to 2022, before making the move to MAGS this year.

Ms Low said being an Agricultural Science teacher is incredibly rewarding, and she aims to inspire and guide the next generation by sharing her passion for Agriculture – inside and outside the classroom.

Deb Crump has vast experience in sheep and dairying mostly in the Taranaki region, and in dry stock and equine industries. She has also established a stud with highperforming, award- winning dairy goats

Ms Crump first began milking cows in 1978 and has since milked cows across

New Zealand, Australia, Ireland, USA and Qatar. She has also managed a large variety of dairy farms, from pasture-based dairy farms to intensive farms in the desert.

She also has more than five years' experience as a large animal vet technician (dairy) in New Zealand and abroad.

Ms Crump has also trained thoroughbred racehorses, one of which you might have spotted on the farm.

She aims to build on the improvements implemented by our previous farm manager, Peter Brice, who, among other things, upgraded the farm's pasture, fencing and drainage as well as overseeing weeding and native planting of the stream and planting more shade trees for stock.

THE EARLY DAYS OF

The school has been involved in Music and Drama since its foundation

The first drama production recorded was Shakepeare's *Merchant of Venice* in 1923. Interestingly, the part of Shylock was played by Reg Harrop, grandfather of the present Headmaster Patrick Drumm.

In 1923 the school also held the first of the annual concerts which were to become a feature of school life until 1967 when the advent of television proved to be more attractive to the Auckland public.

These concerts were held in the Auckland Town Hall and were built around "massed singing", in reality a choir of almost all of the current students. Each concert was different depending on the interests of the students but usually involved music and drama in all its forms.

Concerts were also a valuable fundraiser for the school. In the 1953 programme (see photo) one of the stars was D.C. McIntyre later to be known as Sir Donald McIntyre, a world-renowned opera singer. He also played rugby for the first XV.

Following the demise of the concerts there were a number of small drama performances but it was the arrival of Christine Treseder (now Hallett) as Music teacher in 1978 that revitalised Performing Arts in the school.

She began building a school orchestra and organised the first of a number of concerts held in the library. It was obvious that the school contained a wealth of talent that just needed to be tapped.

The concerts were held over three days and were described

in the school magazine as "a pot pourri of music, drama, language and mime". 1980 was the largest of these concerts, which also involved students from Marist Sisters' College.

In 1981 the school produced the first of a series of eight musicals throughout the 1980s. The first musical chosen was Gilbert and Sullivan's *Pirates of Penzance*, which had five performances at the Mount Albert Memorial Hall. As with the 1980 production, students from Marist Sister's College were enthusiastic participants but the MAGS students needed a lot more encouragement.

According to Eddie
Muliamasealii, this was solved
by Roy Clements, who was to
be the director. One afternoon
he came to Eddie's English
class looking for some boys to
audition.

A number of the boys then decided that leaving class for an audition was preferable to studying English. This became Eddie's first performance in a musical. He went on to perform in three more musicals before going on to a very successful career in opera overseas.

The following year Eddie was joined by his younger brother Sani for *Trial by Jury*, another Gilbert and Sullivan operetta. Like Eddie, Sani was to go on to a successful career in opera as a tenor, unlike his brother who is a bass

In 1983 the two Mount Albert Schools produced the Rogers and Hammerstein musical South Pacific. This was the first appearance by Lucy Ryan, who was later to become very successful in film and television as Lucy Lawless. 1984 saw a

return to Gilbert and Sullivan with *The Mikado*. This was Eddie Muliaumasealii's last school performance in which he was joined again by his brother and Lucy Ryan. (Like Donald McIntyre, Eddie played for the first XV as well.)

After four successful musicals with Marist Sisters' in 1985, MAGS teamed up with Auckland Girls Grammar School to perform West Side Story at the Freeman's Bay Community Centre. This was Sani Muliaumasealii's last school production as Tony, but the male cast was notable for the predominance of rugby players including Olo Brown, who was soon to become an All Black. By this time musicals had become a popular feature of the life of the school and the boys from the then single-sex school enjoyed working and performing with girls from what was then our "sister school". The parties at the end of the "season" were also popular and on several occasions the partying started before the opening curtain.

During the first part of the decade the school also produced a number of dramas - in 1982 The Long and the Short and the Tall (Willis Hollis), followed in 1983 by Tomorrow Will be a Lovely Day (Craig Harrison), And Then There Were None (Agatha Christie) in 1984 and finally in 1985 An Inspector Calls (J.B. Priestley). At this time, the school's roll hovered around the 1000 mark yet there were many students and teachers prepared to devote themselves to the ongoing success of these performances. Many were involved in both dramatic genres.

There are too many former staff members who were involved in these productions to mention but there were three constants across the decade. Roy Clements was the director of the Gilbert and Sullivan operettas and was probably most responsible for encouraging students who would otherwise never have thought of "giving it a go". Christine Hallett was the driving force and oversaw all things musical as well as directing and producing West Side Story and South Pacific. Warwick Gibbs, who is, of course, still on the staff, was the accompanist at every rehearsal and every performance.

There was no musical in 1986 but in 1987 the school returned to Gilbert and Sullivan to produce *HMS Pinafore*, again with Auckland Girls' Grammar School.

The idea of performing again proved attractive to many of the First XV. For the final musical of the decade Christine Hallett returned to *The Pirates of Penzance* in conjunction with Auckland Girls' Grammar. This was to be the last musical for many years as Christine left in 1989 to pursue a career as a singing teacher and the school's music teachers all had other interests.

In 2003 Milica Zjajic-Moon, who had arrived at the school during 2002, produced the first musical of a new era – Gilbert and Sullivan's *The Mikado*.

TE KANI WILLIAMS

Albertian Te Kani Williams was sworn in as a Judge of the Māori Land Court effective from September 2021.

But due to Covid restrictions at the time, he was sworn in over Zoom, and no official ceremony was conducted until March this year at Auckland University.

Te Kani (Tūhoe, Ngāti Manawa, Te Aupōuri, Whakatōhea, Ngāti Tai ki Torere, and Ngāti Maniapoto) came to School House from Ruatoki in 1980. In 1984 he was a Prefect and a member of the Rugby1st XV, and represented Auckland in the Auckland Secondary Schools Rugby Team in 1984.

He graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Māori in 1994 and a Bachelor of Laws in 1995 from the university of Auckland and then joined the law practice of C.J.McGuire in 1994 and became an Associate in that firm in 1997. That firm then amalgamated with D.E Wackrow in 1997 becoming Wackrow & Co, and he became a partner in that firm in 2002 which is currently known as Wackrow Williams & Davies. Te Kani's expertise spans Commercial, Civil litigation, small to medium business work, Family, Māori Legal issues and Te Tiriti work.

However, a considerable component of his legal career has been spent focussing on



Māori Legal issues both in the Māori Land Court, Waitangi Tribunal and in settlement negotiations where he has represented many hapū and iwi and governance bodies.

TAWHIRIMATEA WILLIAMS

In the New Year's Honours Lists for 2023, Albertian Tawhirimatea Williams (Whakatōhea, Ngai Tai ki Torere, Tainui, and Te Aupouri) and his wife Kaa (Tūhoe, Ngati Manawa and Ngati Maniapoto) were both made Companions of the New Zealand Order of Merit for services to Māori and Education.

Tawhirimatea, who was already a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit, attended MAGS from 1954 to 1959. He was a member

of the Rugby 1st XV from 1957 to 1959 and in his last year he was captain. He was also involved in a wide range of other sports and in 1959 received the Victor Ludorum award.

Tawhirimatea was a school prefect in 1958 and 1959, and in 1959 he served as Deputy Head Prefect.

Tawhirimatea trained as a teacher after leaving school and in 1977, as Principal of Ruatoki School, he and his wife set up the first bi-lingual school in the country which is regarded as a model for the Kura Kaupapa schools that have followed.

Since then he has held a wide variety of roles in Māori Education, Te Reo and kapa haka. He is widely respected both in New Zealand and internationally for his knowledge of Te Reo and tikanga Māori.



Congratulations to Professor Russell Stone, who celebrated his 100th birthday on April 7.

Professor Stone attended Mount Albert Grammar from 1936 to 1940 and was heavily involved in the life of the school.

He then studied at Auckland University College (now the University of Auckland), gaining a BA in 1945 and an MA with first class honours in 1949. He taught in secondary schools until he was appointed to the staff of the University of Auckland History Department in 1964 where he completed his PhD in History for his thesis on Auckland Business and Businessmen in the 1880s.

When he retired in 1989 he was given the title of Emeritus Professor. He has continued his research and is considered an authority of the history of early Auckland and on the life of Sir John Logan Campbell.

Professor Stone wrote the history of the school for the 75th jubilee. Tradition and Change: Mount Albert Grammar School: The First Seventy-Five Years was published in 1997 and covers the first 75 years of the He was inducted into the Mount Albert Grammar School Hall of Distinction in 2000, and in the 2002 New Year's Honours list he was appointed an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit for services to historical research.

Professor Stone has been an active member of the school's alumni associations - the Old Boys' Association and (since 2002) the Albertians Association, regularly attending functions and as a sounding board on matters of school history. Recently, he offered advice on the new history of the school Change and Tradition, which was published to mark the centenary. In September last year he assisted in planting the Centennial Tree.



A rising star in Football, Albertian Milly Clegg (2019-2022) was named in the Football Ferns squad for the FIFA Women's World Cup 2023.

Milly joined three other Albertian in the Football Ferns squad – Grace Jale, Malia Steinmetz and Jaqui Hand – for the World Cup.

Milly, 17, left MAGS last year to pursue her football career with the Wellington Phoenix and joined the NZ senior squad earlier this year after a breakout season for club and country, including goals at both the U-17 and U-20 FIFA Women's World Cups.
