The legacy of our first head prefect in 1922, Cecil Cunningham Lamb, continues through to today with two of his great grandnieces currently attending MAGS. One of those descendants, Jessica Lamb (Year 12), joined with an Albertian, Professor Russell Stone, (MAGS 1936-1940) in planting our Centennial Tree as part of festivities.

A Thanksgiving Service in the FW Gamble Hall was followed by a week of sold-out centenary events. The Albertian Luncheon, Cocktail Function and Centennial Dinner were hugely successful with great numbers of of Albertians in attendance – some returning to their school for the first time in many years.



In the midst of this we celebrated the launch of our centennial book "Change and Tradition – Mount Albert Grammar School 100 Years". CENTENARY Dinner



Our Centenary Dinner on October 1 was a celebration of the traditions, advances and diversity that make up the MAGS identity.

Our school is founded on the Four Pillars – Academia, Arts, Service and Sport – and follows the 'MAGS Way' values, and those were all on display and celebrated throughout the night.

MC'ed by Albertian Mark Watson, the event saw Albertians young and old packing out the ballroom at The Grand Millennium Hotel and enjoying musical performances as well as guest speakers such as Sir Bryan Williams, scientist Molly Swanson and our Academic Dean Warwick Gibbs.

First up was another stellar performance by our award-winning Centennial Choir, under the guidance of Terence Maskell.

That was followed by a Headmasters Panel Q&A session with Headmaster Mr Drumm and former headmasters Maurice Hall (1970-88) and Dale Burden (2006-2015), and Noeleen Taylor standing in for her husband Greg, who was headmaster from 1988-2006. Mr Watson quizzed the panel about the changes they had seen and made at MAGS.

Then, Sir Bryan spoke about his time at MAGS and how that had prepared him for becoming an All Black at the age of 19 and a career in law. He said he had lived his life by the MAGS motto of 'Per Angusta Ad Augusta' (Through Hardship to Glory) as nothing had ever come easy in rugby or in law, and then balancing both with family life.

Ms Swanson, who is a research fellow at University of Auckland studying neurodegenerative disease, said she was a quirky teenager but found her place at MAGS and enjoyed the breadth of opportunity that was offered to her.

Before Mr Gibbs' speech, Albertian Tali

Meavale and Deputy Head Prefect Isaiah Nin and Year 13 student Nathan Setefano (on guitar) performed a lively medley of songs.

Mr Gibbs, our Academic Dean, reflected on his 50 years (and counting) in teaching at MAGS and how times had changed since he was employed by Mr Hall fresh out of teachers college. He said teaching wasn't always easy but he had enjoyed learning from his students just as much as teaching them.

Centenary Committee Chair Dale Griffiths wrapped up the evening with a toast to absent friends and one to the school, and presented our Events Manager Emma John with a bouquet of flowers in recognition of her bringing together such a great evening.

To close, everyone got to their feet to sing the School Hymn accompanied by Mr Gibbs on keyboard.

MAGS welcomed Abertians back on September 28 for a day that was all about 'Change and Tradition' (funnily enough, the title of our newly released Centenary book).

The day began with a School Tour, which allowed Albertians to see the changes that had happened to the school campus since they were last here, and also reacquaint themselves with traditional elements such as the F.W. Gamble Hall and its Honours Boards.

A Centenary Tree planting then took place and was conducted by one of our oldest Albertians, Professor Russell Stone (the co-author of MAGS' 75th Jubilee book Tradition and Change) and Year 12 student Jessica Lamb, who is a relative of our first Head Prefect in 1922, C.C. Lamb.

Following the ceremony, there was a special assembly for Year 13s with Albertians in attendance and former Headmaster Maurice Hall, aged 93, as guest speaker.

guest speaker, Dr Peter Phillips, an Emeritus Professor at Yale, who was Dux at MAGS in 1965.

Before he was introduced, Mr Drumm thanked Dr Phillips for donating trophies for our Girls and Boys Dux. As Mr Drumm observed, MAGS presents a multitude of cups at the end of the year but has never in its history had a cup for our Duces. He said it was fitting that was rectified and that they would be presented during our Centenary celebrations.

Our Centennial Choir, who sang at assembly, then performed another item before Dr Phillips spoke about how his early life and his time at MAGS had shaped him and put him on the path to becoming a leading academic and econometrician.

He spoke fondly of his time at MAGS and how his exacting, and sometimes eccentric, teachers had left a lasting impression on him and had helped to steer him into a career he loved.

The Luncheon concluded with Head Prefects Wesley Donald and Lucy Taylor cutting the Centenary Cake.

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CENTENARY BOOK LAUNCH





At the launch of our Centenary book Change and Tradition, Headmaster Mr Drumm thanked author Deborah Dunsford for producing a "taonga" for MAGS that would add to its rich history.

Mr Drumm told guests assembled in the W.O.H. Gibbs Room on September 22 that production of the book was a key part of our Centenary celebrations, and Mrs Dunsford had gone above and beyond the call of duty in producing a fascinating insight into MAGS' past 25 years.

Mrs Dunsford, a local historian, said her book, which focuses on the period 1997-2022, paid tribute to and was a companion to Professor Russell Stone and Neville McMillan's 75th Jubilee book, Tradition and Change, which covers MAGS' history from 1922-1997.

She thanked Professor Stone, an Albertian, for his input and guidance, and said she was indebted to many people at MAGS for their help, including the Centenary Book Committee of Mr Drumm, BoT Chair Greg Moyle, Centenary Committee Chair Dale Griffiths, Assistant Archivist Greg Cave and historian Michael Bassett.

Past headmasters Greg Taylor and Dale Burden, and MAGS Foundation Chair Peter Thorp provided invaluable help and important perspectives on the many changes that had shaped MAGS over the last quarter of a century.

Mrs Dunsford also thanked our long-serving Archivist, Brian Murphy, for his enthusiasm for the school's history and care of its archival material. She added, "I consider myself privileged to have had the opportunity to get to know Mount Albert Grammar School in some depth. It has certainly caused me to reflect on my own secondary education in the 1960s. I enjoyed my school days but these two-anda-half years with MAGS have shown just how good a school can be."

Change and Tradition has a RRP of \$45 but our Centenary pricing has it at \$35, and it can be bought in a bundle with Tradition and Change for \$50.

In an extraordinarily generous gift in our Centenary Year, the ASB has handed the ASB MAGS Farm to our school.

Previously leased from the ASB, the 8.1ha working farm (with an estimated value of \$150 million) was established in 1932 and features horticulture, a variety of livestock, and a classroom centre educating students in Agricultural and Horticultural Science.

A special ceremony to mark the handover was held on September 30 in the MH Building, overlooking the farm, with guests welcomed with karakia and waiata from Matua Peter Walters and Whaea Waimirirangi Paul along with Te Puna o Wairaka students.

At the ceremony, ASB CEO Vittoria Shortt presented Headmaster Mr Drumm with a framed certificate of title for the farm in recognition of the handover.

Ms Shortt said, "We're delighted to be gifting ownership of ASB MAGS Farm to the MAGS Foundation, ensuring that students will continue to benefit from this special learning environment for generations to come.

"Food and fibre production is the backbone of New Zealand's economy, and the farm plays a really important role in attracting young urban talent into these industries."

Mr Drumm said, "ASB MAGS Farm has a 90-year heritage and we're excited to continue its legacy.

"ASB's gift of this land will allow us to continue future-proofing the facilities and further diversifying the farm, and we have ambitious plans for the renovation of existing buildings and the construction of an experience centre to showcase opportunities in the AgriFood and Fibre sector.

"Our students benefit greatly from this education, and it will be enjoyed by generations to come."

MAGS Foundation Chair Peter Thorp said the ASB had been a great partner for the farm, and he hoped that would continue into the future as plans for the experience centre took shape.

Guest speaker at the handover ceremony was Albertian Fatima Imran, who is in her final year of an AgriCommerce degree at Massey University. She was initially attracted to the farm by the thought of looking after sheep and driving a tractor.

But she soon found out there was a whole lot more to the AgriFood and Fibre sector, and working and learning on the farm inspired her to pursue a career in AgriCommerce.

Miller, Alan Li, Devendra Johnston and Sam Taylor-Sinclair each received a silver medal and Certificate of Distinction.

The following day, these students played as individuals in the Championship Trophy event. This was an invitation-only tournament for the top players.

Victor Coen was second overall for this tournament and received a certificate of distinction. Victor also received a gold medal for coming first in the U-14 Division.

Jacob Miller received a gold medal for coming first in the U-16 Division.

It has been a great year for the Senior Debating team, which reached the semifinals.

In their debate to get into the Octofinals, Year 11 Student Ryan Antia was named best speaker.

Coach Ms Walker said "The Mount Albert Senior Debating Team has made a valiant effort in the ruthless debating world this term. They have embraced the challenges that online debating has brought this year to make it through to the Octofinals."

Last year, the team won seven out of their 10 debates through the Junior Open and Junior Championships, proving themselves as one of the top debating teams in Auckland. Now the team has progressed into Senior Open, which has an increased challenge in their topics of debate.

ESPORTS champions



MAGS' Rocket League team has dominated the New Zealand Esports Hyperfibre League (NZEHL) this year, going undefeated over 12 weeks to be crowned champions in the finals held at SkyCity Theatre.

Playing every Thursday, the team (Luka Jeremic – Captain, James Hunt and Caspar van Wetering) did not lose a best-of-three or best-of five series, and only lost 2 out of 31 individual games.

It was a performance that top schools from across the country – including their additional coaches and support – were simply unable to compete against.

MAGS participated in the final at SkyCity with supporters cheering them on.

On Friday, October 7, the team played Macleans College in the Upper Final match, with MAGS winning 3-1, and progressing to the final. Macleans would then go on to beat Rutherford College 3-0 in the lower bracket, to also progress to the final.

The National Final was played on Sunday the 9th, when MAGS once again defeated Macleans 3-1, earning winners' medals and a team trophy.





On August 27, MAGS held its first VEX Robotics scrimmage in 10 years.

Twenty teams and more than 100 students from schools across Auckland competed from excellent robotic schools such as Glenfield, Avondale and Lynfield.

The feature of this competition was the game Spin Up where students design, build and code a robot. The robot was required to shoot discs into goals, be able to horizontally expand in area and spin cylindrical goals for its team. MAGS entered three teams and two advanced to the playoff rounds.

One, led by Anatol Coen and Nick Lees, won a series of hard-fought games and made it to the final where they were narrowly defeated.

Max Davison, Robotics Captain, said, "The day was a massive success with students showcasing their hard work and skills in the lead-up to the national competition.

"The MAGS robotics team showed great enterprise by running a fundraiser selling pizzas, doughnuts and baking which will go towards new robot parts and developing the next generation of robotics students."

WORLD VISION Advocacy Ambassadors

Year 13s Rishita Bharani and Sonia Airehrour have been appointed Advocacy Ambassadors at World Vision in 2023.

Outdoor Ed

As part of an Outdoor Education unit on Bushcraft, students went on an outdoor overnight survival training course in August run by SOS Survival, who have a military background and work at a base near Muriwai.

The course focused on the essentials of survival: protection, location, water and food, and gave the students a practical insight into some basic survival skills.

During the course the students started by learning about the basic principles of survival, followed by some basic knots used for a variety of purposes. They then learned how to build a natural shelter to sleep in and developed fire lighting skills in the bush. They then had to cook on their fire and maintain it overnight for warmth as well as sleep in the shelter they had made.

Mr Belson said, "It was an awesome experience with lots of learning in a practical environment as well as ensuring that what you did, did not have poor outcomes."

Our 13 Outdoor Education class participated in a rogaine, a fourday class navigation exercise in August in the Kaimai-Mamaku Forest Park between Te Aroha and Katikati.

Each group had 37 hours to find as many checkpoints as possible before returning to the start/finish line in Te Aroha on time to avoid any time penalties.





Wherever they were at 5.30pm was where they had to sleep the night and they weren't allowed to move again until 7.00am the next day.

Head of Outdoor Education Mr Whitehead said, "It was a real test of their leadership, group work and adaptability to find as many marked features as possible.

On the third day of competition, NZ lost 6-12 to Victoria and played them again on the last day in a third/fourth play-off.

NZ led for most of the game but eventually went down 6-8.

ORIENTEERING

At the NISS and National Orienteering Champs over the July school holidays, Molly McGowan won all four Senior Girls titles across the two championships.

Molly won the Senior Girls Sprint and Long events at North Islands and at the National Schools Championships in Auckland.

Team Manager Neill McGowan said, "Winning all four titles is a fantastic achievement for Molly and rare in recent Orienteering history. In the NZSS races, she held off strong competition from Orienteers who were fresh from their return from Junior World Championships in Portugal".

"She won the Sprint by nearly three minutes and the Long by nine minutes at NISS, and then won the NZSS Sprint by a tight three seconds and then the Long by 22 seconds".

Molly's achievements were part of a team effort that saw MAGS Orienteering Boys take out the North Island's Top Secondary School for the sixth year in a row as well as winning the Premier School competition.

The Girls finished third for the third successive year with a huge gap to Diocesan in 4th place (197 points behind). The Boys took out an Auckland Grammar team by 66 points, with Pukekohe a distant third, to maintain their dominance over the last few years.

As well as Molly's victories, there were wins for Callum Wishart (Senior Boys – Long), Sam Carryer (Intermediate Boys – Sprint), the Senior Boys Relay and Intermediate Boys Relay.

In the second week of the July school holidays, the team then went on to the National Secondary Schools Championships.

Again they were supreme, winning the Top Secondary School for the fourth time in a row and the Premier School competition again. The Boys came out on top again, beating an Auckland Grammar team by 74 points, with Havelock North in 3rd. The Girls finished third for the second successive year with Diocesan 195 points behind. On top of Molly's wins, there was a victory for the Intermediate Boys Relay.



MAGS Orienteers won both Senior individual grades and all the Boys Team grades at the AKSS Rogaine in August at Riverhead Forest, with over 200 students in attendance.

There were individual wins for Luka Johnson (Senior Boys) and Molly McGowan (Senior Girls), and the team winners were Senior Boys (Tom Aish & Daniel Wood), Intermediate Boys (Matthew Greenwood & Sam Carryer), and Junior Boys (William Wood & Anthony Wood).

Just before the October school holidays, seven MAGS orienteers were selected to represent New Zealand at the Southern Cross Challenge in Victoria, Australia.

NZ selected two teams to compete against the seven Australian states and the teams finished 1st and 2nd.

In individual races there were a number of outstanding performances and podium finishes from Molly McGowan, Daniel Wood, Callum Wishart, Sam Carryer and Matthew Greenwood.

Standout performances came from Molly McGowan (2nd in 20 Elite in the Australian Sprint and 3rd in 20 Elite in the Australian Long), Daniel Wood (1st in M18A in Australian Sprint) and Sam Carryer (1st in M16A in the Australian Middle).

Senior students Molly McGowan and Daniel Wood both won the Under 20 Elite Grades at the Northern Region Club Championships in Woodhill Forest in October.

Held over three days with a last day chasing start, both MAGS Orienteers headed out together ahead of the pack.

Molly took out a highly competitive national field by over 11 minutes, extending her lead on the final day, with Daniel holding on impressively to win by nearly 2 minutes. Callum Wishart had a strong run on Day 3 to finish in 3rd place.

There was a full MAGS podium in the Boys 16 grade with Sam Carryer winning by 9 minutes, beating Matthew Greenwood and Reuben Adye. In the Boys 14 Grade William Wood finished 1st, winning by 12 minutes.



Football

Year 12 student Milly Clegg has had a stellar year, playing international football and being signed to the Wellington Phoenix, who play in the Women's A-League.

She showed why the Phoenix chose to sign her when, as a 16-year-old and the youngest player in the Under-20 New Zealand squad in Costa Rica, she started all three matches and scored a great goal in a 2-2 draw with Colombia in August at the U-20 Women's Football World Cup.

Following that tournament, she travelled to India for the U-17 Women's Football World Cup where she was the only Kiwi to score in losses to Germany and Chile.

ASB MAGS FARM

The ASB MAGS Farm now officially belongs to MAGS.

This amazing piece of generosity from ASB in handing over the land to the MAGS Foundation ensures that our MAGS students and many others will continue to get their hands (and uniforms) dirty learning basic agriculture and horticulture practices in the heart of New Zealand's biggest city.

It is great that ASB has supported the school in the centenary year and that the ASB MAGS Farm could become part of the celebrations. The farm is 90 this year so we will be looking forward to our own centenary celebrations in 10 years' time.

On the farm we have experienced our wettest July ever, with 285mm of rain, bookended by above average rainfall in June and August. This has created issues with wet paddocks and lanes, not being able to "pre-lamb shear" our sheep and, combined with greater warmth, has meant there were a few more pesky bugs and diseases around.

Hygiene has been emphasised to all visitors, from students to other groups, as quite often these bugs can be harmful to humans also. Students play a crucial role in monitoring the health of the livestock with the many eyes over the animals often picking out lame sheep or problems with our calves whilst they are feeding them.

Along with animal health monitoring, we have shorn our store lambs with help from Peter Letif at Auckland Council who manages the southern region farms.

He gave a demo to some Year 10 students, some of whom left realising how hard the job is, but also how well it can pay.

Farming has many opportunities to reward hard work, which is

a message we are keen to get across. Although we don't teach the students how to shear, Peter got some students involved in flipping the sheep over and supervised some shearing!

We are grateful to the Ghella Abergeldie JV (GAJV) construction company for helping our students 'Boots n' All'! GAJV is building a giant underground wastewater tunnel for Watercare running from Mangere Wastewater Treatment Plant to the central city and one of their construction sites is next to the Roy Clements Treeway.

They have donated many pairs of brand new gumboots, which no longer meet safety requirements, refreshing our gumboot locker and even allowing us to cater for the students with size 14 feet! These are the same people that, along with Watercare, supported our native tree planting initiatives on the farm that have grown so well over the last three years.

Of course we have lambed our ewes this spring, about to finish milking cows and feeding calves, and now have kiwifruit flowering so there is always something happening here on the farm.

Even the French Women's Rugby team heard about us and wanted to visit and get their head out of the game before their semifinal against the Black Ferns.

It has been a challenging year but again we have graduates heading off to Lincoln and Massey this year, which is always nice to see.

Albertian Max Weston (1947-51) passed away on August 6, aged 88 years.

He was a member of the Senior 8 in 1950 and 1951, and a Prefect in 1951.

Max was also a member and stalwart of the West End Rowing Club since 1950, when he started rowing for MAGS.

During his rowing career Max won four NZ Championship Eight Titles (Redcoats) for West End. During his membership Max held nearly every position at the club: Committee member, Club Secretary, Club Captain, President and Patron. In 1980 he was honoured with being made a Life Member.

Max was heavily involved in MAGS rowing via this connection with West End during the 70s and 80s.

He also made other major contributions to the sport of rowing, holding many positions with the Auckland Rowing Association and as part of the team that organised the 1978 World Rowing Championship regatta at Lake Karapiro.



Emeritus Professor Trevor Wilson AM FAHA passed away peacefully on 11 June at the age of 93.

Trevor, a renowned military historian of World War I was elected to the Australian Academy of the Humanities in 1973.

Born in Auckland, New Zealand, in 1928, he attended MAGS from 1942-45 and completed a Master of Arts at Auckland University in 1952 and a PhD at the University of Oxford in 1959, where his dissertation was the joint winner of the Gilbert Campion Award.

While completing his PhD at Oxford, Trevor worked as a research assistant in Government at the University of Manchester.



Distinguished academic and Albertian Sir Graeme Davies (1950-54) died at home on August 30 after a brief illness at the age of 85.

At MAGS, Sir Graeme was Dux in 1954 and focused his studies on Mathematics and Science.

Headmaster at the time Murray Nairn noted in his testimonial: "He has also taken a full part in outside activities. He has played Soccer for school teams each year and in his last two years has been in the 1st Association XI. After playing Cricket for two years he changed to Softball and has been in the 1st IX the last two years. Other activities include successes in Swimming events and Life Saving, Choir work, and progress in the Cadet Battalion to the position of Regimental Quarter Master Serjeant." Sir Graeme graduated from the University of Auckland with a BE in Aeronautical Engineering and a PhD in Materials Science.

He then arrived as Fellow to St Catharine's College, Cambridge in 1962, subsequently becoming an internationally distinguished academic metallurgist.

During the following 30 years he led and transformed a series of institutions of higher education.

He was Professor of Metallurgy and Pro Vice-Chancellor at the University of Sheffield 1977-1986; Vice-Chancellor of the University of Liverpool 1986-91; Chief Executive of the Higher Education Funding Council 1991-95; Principal of the University of Glasgow 1995-2003; Vice-Chancellor of the University of London 2003-11, and the only Emeritus VC the University has appointed.

He served many more public institutions and charities in the UK and overseas and received extensive honours for his contributions. Sir Graeme was knighted in 1996 for his services to higher education.

Sir Graeme was awarded 13 honorary degrees during his lifetime and published many books, mainly on metallurgy.

He is survived by his wife Svava, his son Michael, his daughter Helena and five grandchildren.

Sir Graeme was inducted into MAGS' Hall of Distinction in 2009 (as pictured).

He took up the position of Lecturer in History at the University of Adelaide in 1960. It was here that he spent most of his professional career; he became Senior Lecturer in 1965 and Professor of History in 1968.

During his tenure at the University of Adelaide, he was a Commonwealth Fellow at St John's College, the University of Cambridge in 1972, a Visiting Fellow to the Australian National University in 1982 and a Visiting Fellow at Magdalen College, the University of Oxford, in 1987.

Trevor was elected as a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society and, in 2007, appointed an Honorary Member (AM) in the General Division of the Order of Australia "for service to education in the area of World War I military history through teaching, writing and historical research". In 2009, he was made Emeritus Professor in History at the University of Adelaide; a post he retained until his death.

He authored The Downfall of the Liberal Party 1914-1935 (1966) and The Political Diaries of C.P. Scott 1911-1928 (1970). His numerous books on World War I include The Myriad Faces of War: Britain and the Great War 1914-1918 (1986), and, with Robin Prior, Command on the Western Front: The Military Career of General Sir Henry Rawlinson 1914-1918 (1992), Passchendaele: The Untold Story (1996), The First World War (1999) and The Somme (2005).

He also appeared in The Great War and the Shaping of the 20th Century (1996), airing originally in the United States on PBS and later in Britain and Australia.

Trevor is survived by his wife Jane and his two children.

JOHN BLENNERHASSET

Professor John Blennerhassett (MB ChB (NZ) FRCPCan FRCPAus Pathology, Emeritus Professor since 1997, died peacefully at home in Wānaka on June 29 at age 89.

John was born in Auckland in 1933 to Mary and Ray (Blen) Blennerhassett, both teachers, who instilled in him a love of learning, words, cryptic crosswords and reading.

He spent his early years around the North Island, particularly Northland. John's early schooling (years 1-5) was in Matauri Bay where his father was principal at the school.

When Blen enlisted in 1940, John's mother returned to teaching and he went to boarding school.

At the tender age of seven John realised his ambition was to be a doctor. He was encouraged by his teacher, Dulcie Vadanovich, to attend a bigger school that would provide the environment needed to reach his potential.

He came to MAGS in 1949 then went on to Otago University for his undergraduate studies, supported throughout by his parents.



At Otago he met Jill, who was studying Phys Ed, and the two married two days after John's graduation.

Children soon followed: first twins, John and Jennie, then Nicola, and Stewart. After graduating, John and Jill moved to Wellington where John spent several years as a house surgeon at Wellington Hospital, where he realised pathology was his calling.

In order to chase his dreams and specialist studies the family embarked on a journey to North America, firstly Boston to a position at Mass General Hospital and as teaching fellow at Harvard University. There another two children were added to the family: Robyn and Hamish.

John then secured a position as associate pathologist at Royal Victoria Hospital with appointment as associate professor of pathology at Magill University in Montreal. Returning to Boston and Mass General as head of surgical pathology, John was appointed assistant professor at Harvard University.

The family spent eight years in North America.



In 1969, John was called by a couple of old classmates to let him know a position as professor of pathology was open at his alma mater, Otago Medical School. The family returned to Dunedin in 1970.

John continued in his positions until his official retirement from the chair of pathology in 1996, and finally his resignation from Dunedin Hospital in early 2000s. He continued teaching and examining both in NZ and Australia for some years after.

John was an active member of a number of organisations including the Cancer Society, Rotary, Probis and U3A. Community service and contribution were important to him. His social groups also held a great enjoyment for him; The Wānaka Experience, AOK biking group and the Knotty Points tennis group.

John and Jill built a holiday home in Wānaka in the early 1970s and retired there in 2002.

They enjoyed their retirement in Wānaka, which saw them set up wedding venue The Olive Grove.

Albertian Don Hammond (1949-1952), a NZ Rugby League representative and captain, passed away on July 30, aged 85.

Don originally played for the Mount Albert Lions in the Auckland Rugby League competition.

He represented and captained Auckland and first played for the New Zealand Kiwis team in 1961.

Whilst making his debut in 1961, Hammond developed a lethal combination alongside another MAGS old boy, Ron Ackland. Together they blended speed and ball-playing ability with strength, tackling tenacity and courage needed to prosper in the rugged forward battles.

From there forward, Don went on to play in 20 test matches, including six as captain (1961-65).

In 1964, Don won the Rothville Trophy as the Auckland Rugby League Player of the Year. That year he also won the New Zealand Rugby League's Player of the Year award as he was a stand-out performer when the Kiwis whitewashed France in a three-test home series.

A stalwart of the Kiwis Association, Don was prominent in establishing and becoming curator of the excellent NZRL museum.

Don was inducted as an NZRL life member in 2006 followed by an induction into the Legends of League in 2010. He went on to be elected President of the Kiwis Association.

FROM THE Archives

Mount Albert Grammar School has two archivists, Brian Murphy and Greg Cave.

While they are always collecting and sorting material that records the history of the school, for the past two or three years the focus for them has been the centennial.

The school now has a database of the names of students who entered the school as Year 9 students (or Form 3).

This database begins in 1945 but plans are afoot to extend this back to the opening of the school.

The recently published Change and Tradition includes lists of sports captains, prefects and top academic prizewinners beginning in 1997.

The earlier history, Tradition and Change, contains lists of senior sports teams going back to 1922. Complete lists of sports teams since 1997 have been digitised and will hopefully be available on the website in 2023.

Mr Cave has published on the school website "100 Years of Photos" – https://www.mags.school.nz/the-school/centenaryphotos-by-decade/ – which is a record of form classes and sports teams going back to 1922.

This is an ongoing project and photos of more recent years have yet to be added. For some years there are not many photos available and there is a permanent request for people to submit photos so that this collection can be made more complete. The oldest class photo is from 1923 and only recently came to light.

Deputy Principal John Stradwick has used some of the photos to create a powerpoint slideshow, which is displayed in the staffroom and was also used at centennial events.

With the help of some senior students John also created a display of memorabilia going back to the early days of the school outside A1.

The school archives continue to grow each year but MAGS welcomes donations of material of any sort that helps to fill in more of the details of the life of the school.
