Welcome to the second edition of The Lion for 2024 as we come to the close of an excellent 2024 for the young people of MAGS.

It has been a year of resurgence as students re-engaged in activities across the school in numbers not seen since 2019. Almost 1800 students pulled on the Cambridge Blue and Gold of MAGS and headed into the sporting arena to represent their school. Individuals and teams drawn from within this group have brought multiple national and regional titles back to MAGS.

Standing proud amongst these achievements has been the journey of our Girls Football 1st XI. The front cover showcases the Year 13 members of the team and the clean sweep of trophies they have claimed this year. Unbeaten across the season, they have claimed every major trophy on offer – The Auckland Premier Championship, Auckland Knockout Cup, Grammar Cup and National Secondary Schools' Championship!

These seven Year 13 students have been instrumental in creating a culture of success within the wider team. Working alongside their coaching staff, the girls built on the experiences and challenges from previous years, growing into a formidable team in 2024. Perhaps the greatest credit this group can claim is the succession they have ensured with the champion premier squad consisting of students from Years 9-13!

The key role of sport as a driver of culture at MAGS cannot be underestimated. The Foundation Masters of the school in 1922 had an intrinsic understanding of the power of sport to create identity and belonging – to create community.

The inaugural year of the school saw Foundation Headmaster Freddie Gamble make the bold decision to enter MAGS teams into Premier competitions across Auckland. With the oldest students at MAGS that first year being barely 15 years of age, our earliest MAGS sportsmen were confronted with older and bigger opposition every week!. Yet setting the highest expectations early on for our new school quickly paid dividends with MAGS teams claiming many Auckland titles in its first few years.

Courage, pride, resilience, humility – the sporting arena provides an unparalleled context for developing core values – and growing good young men and women.

Fast forward 103 years and that formula has changed little. Sport (along with the Arts and Service) continues to build the character and values we want in our young people. Sport done well provides a counter-cultural focus in the modern age. It allows people to genuinely connect with each other – in person, face to face, liberated from technology (for a while at least). It's difficult to catch a ball, row a boat or shoot a hoop with a mobile phone in your hand! And we like it like that!

It is these multiple lenses we can use to measure success that elevates the true value of sport at MAGS. We love bringing home the silverware – and our bursting trophy cabinet speaks loudly to the importance of winning.

But sport brings so much more to a school. The opportunity to show leadership – particularly when the results don't go our way – when the disappointment is high in the post-match changing room! It's easy to steer the ship when the sea is calm – to be a great teammate when we're winning! But real leaders step up and reveal their character when we are faced with stormy waters! Those times when the scoreboard is not our friend! That is when your team-mates really need you!

Like all things in life, the journey of our champion footballers has been anything but a straight line. They have triumphed over adversity from previous years and rebounded from the brutal lessons that narrow sporting losses can bring.

Yet, here they are triumphant, enjoying success in the present and looking forward to life after school. As a point of interest, this years' Olympic Football Ferns included four Albertians – three who were part of the last MAGS National Champion Premier Girls Football Team in 2016! We will certainly follow the future of our latest champions with great interest!

This year we farewell our long-serving teacher and Director of Cricket, Tony Sail, who is retiring.

Mr Sail was guest speaker at the Sports Awards Dinner in October, and reflected on his 22 years at MAGS.

He came to MAGS after deciding to put his family first and quit toplevel coaching with the Auckland Aces

Mr Sail recalls: I'm always so proud to be able to say I teach at MAGS. To wear the lion. To be part of the Pride.

From the day I arrived in 2003, it has been a very special place to be. The diversity and culture within the campus is incredibly special. We greet each other with genuine care.

I was fortunate enough to see it transition from quite a selfdeprecating and unassertive place, where everyone seemed to want to do okay, but no one really wanted to put up their hand or head.

It had reasonable students, an alumni to be proud of and talented and comfortable teachers, some just brilliant, and many part of a wonderful core of long-serving 'MAGS for Lifers'.

We were all comfortable, and under-achieving.

The school was about to shed its deprecation and unassertiveness and re-announce itself. It was now shouting to all and sundry that we are going to be the king of the jungle.

It was 'The MAGS Way' of excellence in all things academic, arts, service and sport. You didn't want to be left behind. As a director and coach you could certainly feel the expectation.

We were a bit light on cricket talent. Cricketers had tended to drift to other schools.

The development of academy classes allowed for greater skill development, a point of difference, a chance to aim for excellence.

But there was another problem. The lack of self-belief, and the important portion of mongrel required to compete, was in short supply at MAGS. The imposter syndrome was a ball and chain.

Our players felt they didn't belong.

The school-wide change, created a platform, from which, we could instil in our teams the desire for excellence that was now an expectation.

We worked hard, developed great cohesion, produced a few magic tactical manoeuvres here and there, and became very competitive.

We played more games of cricket against schools from other regions and we embarked on a few tours, to the home of Bradman in Australia and to the home of cricket, Lords in London.

On the mezzanine floor at the cricket nets at Lords there is a picture of the 1949 Blackcaps team that toured England. There were three former MAGS students in that team. There is a legacy.

We included trips to the Battlefields of Ypres and Passchendaele where we viewed the headstones of those lost from our community, while giving service to our country. We played at and against some of the best schools in England and Australia and top clubs in Belgium and France.

I'm very very Proud to say that MAGS is now recognised as a cricket school, and we expect to win every time we play.

A simple strategy powered the success of the Football Girls 1st XI this year.

Head Coach Kate Inwood said the team set out to build on the successes of last season, with a goal to place in the top two of each competition it entered

"Not only did we meet that goal, but we exceeded it, finishing the season undefeated and claiming the Grammar Cup, the APC Cup, the AKSS Premier League title, and the national title. This incredible achievement was made possible thanks to our extended squad of 32 players, all working tirelessly in training and games. Their dedication was evident, as even our 2nd XI won their league."

At the NZSS Premier Tournament in Nelson, well-taken goals in each half were enough for MAGS to defeat Baradene 2-1 in the final. Team manager Mrs Wilson was also named Manager of the Tournament.

In the Auckland competition, the Girls went undefeated (10 wins and a draw – 32 goals for, 6 against) and finished on 31 points. The last time MAGS Girls won the league was in 2016.

Our Girls Junior A team also won their APC Final, beating Baradene 1-0.

Ms Inwood added, "I'm incredibly proud of the entire squad, especially our leadership group. Thanks to the fantastic leadership and role models throughout the team, our team culture has transformed into one that's supportive, fun, hardworking, and driven.

Heading into Nationals, we were a relatively inexperienced group, with only 7 of our 16 players having competed at nationals before. This year also marked the first time we brought more than one junior, with four juniors in the squad, as well as three sets of sisters, making the tournament even more special. "Professional" was the keyword for us, and we lived up to that, earning praise from tournament organizers, officials, and other teams alike."

Ms Inwood said she was supported by a "dream team" of Michael Brook, with his coaching support; Jess Wilson, for her outstanding job managing the team; and Rosie Missen, who brilliantly coached the 2nd XI


Our Technology Leaders ran their annual Digital Day at MAGS on September 24.

After a five-year hiatus, the interschool Pursuits Competition, organised by the New Zealand Commerce and Economics Teachers' Association, returned to the University of Auckland's Business School.

Students faced seven rounds of questions – a mixture of subject-related content as well as current events and general knowledge.

HoF Commerce Mr Gilbert said, "Competition was fierce and our students performed well against many elite schools. Our Business Studies team finished 5th whilst our Accounting team narrowly finished 4th. "Although not winning either of the two competitions, our students performed well and represented the school extremely well. We look forward to entering this competition next year and pushing to get into the top three places."



The Lion Foundation Young Enterprise programme spans the entire school year and helps students, from schools all over New Zealand, discover their potential in business and in life.

In July, two Year 13 Business Studies students, Noah Curtis and Rimu Frandi, joined 64 others from across Aotearoa to participate in the Entrepreneurs in Action (EIA) event. This was a four-day, action-packed, immersive learning programme hosted by Young Enterprise Scheme (YES) in Wellington.

The students were mentored by NZ businesses and tackled two real-world problems.

Each participant received a \$1000 Massey University Scholarship, and the winners of each business challenge were awarded an additional \$3000 scholarship. Noah Curtis, pictured above at front left, was one of the recipients of this scholarship award. His team won the second challenge issued by NZ Trade and Enterprise, which was to form a market entry strategy for a Kiwi skincare brand.

Noah was also selected as one of eight New Zealand students to travel to Brazil for LatAM Biz, a joint programme between the Latin American Centre of Asia-Pacific Excellence and YES.



In August, four of our students – Ryan Antia, Nishka Arora, Nika Rahmati and Krrish Patel – attended the Deloitte Case Challenge YES Workshop Event and spent the day problem-solving and networking.

They got the opportunity to collaborate with other Auckland school students and tackled a hypothetical business case with guidance from Deloitte mentors.





ASS FARM

Lots has happened on farm since the last report.

Labels and packaging for our sheep milk soaps and lotions have been designed by Media Studies students and look great. We are just working through economic printing options with these.

The sunflower paddock has been sprayed out, harrowed, fertilised and planted ready for a stunning display around Xmas/New Year (weather permitting).

Due to poor spring growth, the cattle have been moved on a lot earlier than normal.

The Kiwifruit canopy is looking great, and we should have a very good fruiting season this year.

The ACES students have been coming in twice a week and have planted out the fruit trees so generously donated by Board of Trustees member Greg Moyle. Melena Myles has also been integral in the running of the orchard and horticultural area, and her knowledge of all things "plant and tree" is much appreciated.

The ACES students will also be planting vege gardens, with the produce from these being used to give back to those in our community who need a hand up.

We have just started harrowing and topping paddocks and spraying with an NPK seaweed fertiliser.

I have a number of students who are very keen on the practical side of farming and who turn up at 6.00am seven days a week! Great commitment and an excellent opportunity to get them involved with skills such as milking, weighing, drenching, vaccinations, B12 shots, hoof treatments, mastitis detection and weaning and feeding of stock.

I also have three farm cadets for a full day every Wednesday; whatever I am doing on farm they are doing, from fencing to spraying.

D'ARCY BROWN

One of our most successful academics, Albertian D'arcy Brown (2015-2018) returned to MAGS to talk about his Scholarship journey at assembly and inspire students to take on the exams.

In his final year, D'arcy was Proxime Accessit (runner-up to Dux) after being first in French, Classics, Economics, English and History in Year 13, and winning the Calder Senior History prize and gaining the John Williamson Scholarship.

D'arcy, who was introduced to the assembly by Deputy Principal Mr Powell, above, entered three scholarship exams, French, Classics, and History, gaining scholarships in History and Classics.

He spent his first year post-high school in France, learning a new language and culture before returning to NZ to pursue an Arts degree, majoring in Philosophy, Politics and Economics at Victoria University Wellington, graduating last year.

While at Victoria he was Vice President of the Student Volunteer Army in Wellington, awarded a Te Tini a Rehua award as a top Maori undergraduate student, co-taught an inaugural Global Studies program and tutored French.

Last year, after finishing at Victoria, he started working for All Good, a social enterprise in New Zealand giving back to communities in Ecuador, through investment in schools, female-led businesses and fair wages for banana farmers. He's currently a candidate for a Rhodes Scholarship, which allows students to study at Oxford University.

D'arcy spoke about how sitting the Scholarship exams was not just about achievement but also about the lifetime benefits of aiming high, taking on challenges and being disciplined in the pursuit of your goals.





PORTIA WOODMAN-WICKLIFFE

Albertian Portia Woodman-Wickliffe (2005-09) has signed off on a glittering international rugby career with gold for the Black Ferns Sevens at the Paris Olympics in July.

The Black Ferns defeated Canada 19-12 in the final to claim gold at the Games, which Portia had already announced would be her last campaign for the Black Ferns.

Portia, of Ngapuhi descent, has been a record-breaking try-scorer for the Black Ferns and had already won gold in the Sevens at Tokyo 2020.

In her Black Ferns XVs and Sevens career, which began in 2013, she has won World Cups twice in each format as well as Commonwealth gold in the Sevens.

Congratulations to the four Albertians who were named in the Football Ferns squad for the Paris Olympics.

Forwards Milly Clegg, Jacqui Hand and Grace Jale, and midfielder Malia Steinmetz were part of the 18-strong squad that had close losses to hosts France, Canada and Colombia, and exited the tournament at the group stage.

They had also been part of the Football Ferns squad for the Women's World Cup, hosted by New Zealand and Australia.

Malia Steinmetz, pictured at top left in the squad photo, is playing for Danish club Nordsjælland in the top Danish women's league, Jacqui Hand (No. 16) is playing for Sheffield United in the English Women's Championship, Grace Jale (No. 18) is



playing for the Wellington Phoenix in the A League, and Milly Clegg is playing for Racing Louisville in the National Women's Soccer League in the United States.

JOHN STRADWICK

Our former Deputy Principal John Stradwick was named Albertian of the Year 2024 for 'Leadership and Service to Education'.

Mr Stradwick, who has been appointed Principal of Cashmere High School in Christchurch, was acknowledged at the Year 13 Assembly on September 25 and at Staff Briefing on September 27.

Mr Stradwick was Head Prefect at MAGS in 1993 and rejoined the School in 2018 as Deputy Principal from Ormiston Junior College, where he was Deputy Principal.

He and his wife Anna had lived in Mt Albert with their three sons, two of whom were attending MAGS before their move south

At the assembly, Headmaster Mr Drumm said Mr Stradwick's contribution to our school and students over the past six years has been very significant.

Among his many responsibilities, Mr Stradwick oversaw Year 13, the Prefects group and student leadership, led curriculum, was involved in the school's strategic plan, and oversaw the Arts Faculty and professional learning for teachers. He had also coached football and cricket, as well as supporting the numerous service programmes that so many staff and students are involved in.

Mr Drumm said, "We often talk about the importance of you as students being involved right across our MAGS Pillars. But this is also important for our staff – and Mr Stradwick has modelled that in every way.

"He has led the Curriculum area of the school working with all of the Heads of

Faculties.

"He has also managed a number of sports teams, including the 1st XV Rugby this year. Mr Stradwick recently travelled to Wellington as manager of the Centennial Choir as they won Gold at the National Finale.

"He has redesigned our student leadership programme with a real focus on growing leadership right across the school – and a big part of that has been looking after the Prefects group."

Before the Albertian of the Year salver was presented to Mr Stradwick at assembly by Albertian and MAGS Foundation member Dale Griffiths, pictured ????, Mr Drumm said, "On behalf of all of our MAGS community, I thank Mr Stradwick for what he has done for our school. You leave our school in great heart and we wish you all the best with your new adventure at Cashmere."

The Centennial Choir then sang a humorous song about and for Mr Stradwick to the tune of Edelweiss, and students performed a haka for him.

At Staff Briefing, Mr Gibbs, pictured ???, presented the Albertian of the Year salver to Mr Stradwick in front of staff, and reminisced about being his German teacher back in the 1990s.

Mr Gibbs said, "To me he is still the small enthusiastic boy with a shock of blonde hair. He moved from third stream to second stream to first stream in succeeding years. His reports speak of his gift of the gab. Sixth Form accounting: "It was with his sense of humour and excellent communication skills that he impressed me most". A bit of a backhander. From PE: "John always

has a lot to say but I have no complaints about his attitude". Seventh Form History: "John approaches the subject with goodhumoured easiness".

Mr Gibbs added: "He is an honest man, a truthful man, and a decent man. He is a man bubbling with ideas: he brought us mentoring, for which I have only just forgiven him."

Mr Stradwick thanked everyone for their generous words but said he felt like he was just getting started and the Albertian of the Year award was "more a vote of confidence for my future endeavours in education".

He said his time at MAGS highlighted how dedicated and compassionate staff made a difference to students' lives every day.

"It's the people—the highly skilled, passionate, dedicated staff—who truly define what Mount Albert Grammar is all about.

"Great expert teachers, highly skilled coaches, and excellent support staff. It's impossible to get outstanding outcomes with average adults."

He added, "I have been incredibly fortunate to work here at MAGS, a leading school in the country. I am proud of how MAGS fosters a sense of belonging for everyone in our large community.

Opportunities to lead, contribute and grow are woven into the fabric of our school, and I encourage everyone to get involved and push yourselves to the next level. While I am excited about the new opportunities ahead, I will deeply miss the people and the vibrant environment that make MAGS so special."



FROM THE ARCHIVES:

MORE THAN JUST A CHAIR



Most of us do not enjoy a visit to the dentise but at least we can be sure that we will not be treated in a World War II folding army field dentist's chair.

This chair is part of the school archives and belonged to Newton Wickham (aka 'Wicky'), who used it extensively in the North African campaign and the Italian campaign.

Wicky was born in Stratford in 1917 and attended Mount Albert Grammar School from 1931 to 1934. He went through the school in the "A" stream, passed University Entrance in 1933, and in 1934 gained a pass in the Scholarship exam.

He was involved in a variety of activities in the school but was a particularly good hockey player and played for the first XI in his last two years at school. After leaving school he studied dentistry and graduated in 1939. During his studies he also represented Otago University College in hockey.


At the outbreak of war in 1939, Wicky was practising as a dental surgeon at Wellington Hospital.

He joined the army medical corps as a First Lieutenant in 1940 and treated troop at Burnham Military camp prior to them going overseas.

In September 1940 he left for the Middle East as a Dental Corps Officer. He served throughout the North African Campaign (1940 to 1943) and was promoted to Captain and later Major.

His dental truck (see illustration and pictures) was developed into a full dental unit which operated very close to the front line.

Besides ordinary dental cases Wicky ha to deal with facial battle wounds. On one





occasion, after being separated from his unit, he brought 24 men and four trucks back to safety. For this he was mentioned in dispatches.

The New Zealand troops were transferred to Italy in late 1943 and Wicky continued his work until the end of the war in May 1945. He then went to England where he treated prisoners of war released from Germany.

where he graduated Doctor of Dental
Surgery. He returned to New Zealand
and set up practice as the country's first
practising periodontist, also continuing
research and development of dental
devices. In 1983 he was made a Commander
of the British Empire, CBE, for services to
dentistry. He was also Colonel Commander
of the Territorial Royal New Zealand Dental
Corps.

Newton Wickham was a man of hig moral principles and a philanthropist

He was an active campaigner against smoking, worked as a volunteer dentist in villages throughout the South Pacific and Indo-China, and was Honorary Vice Consu for Brazil for nine years.

He attended MAGS functions regularly and played hockey for the old boys' team for many years.

In 2009 he was inducted into the school's Hall of Distinction for services to dentistry. That year he also donated a large amount of money to be set up as a trust which is used for the junior dux awards at the annual prizegiving. Last years' recipients were Alodia Ke and Joshua Radcliffe.
