Mr P. Vesely arrived from South Africa to join the Physical Education Department



Gibbs who was awarded a Goethe Institute Scholarship which enabled him to travel to Munich and undertake there a course for $2\frac{1}{2}$ months in German language and literature. Subsequently he toured through Germany and France.

Two senior members of the staff are on leave for 1976. Mr E. L. Cheriton goes to lecture in Education at the Secondary Teachers' College (Mr Belsham will run the Geography Department in his absence). Mr A. M. Wilson has been seconded to the Education Department as an Advisor in Art. Mr P. Taylor, who has been with us for a month or two, will keep things going until his return.

Early in the year we lost the services of Mr F. M. Moore through ill health. We wish him a speedy recovery. Mr E. W. Cosgrove, from Sydney, continues his work.

Three men who have each been with us a few years resigned at the end of 1975. Mr P. Huckle who has been in charge of Physical Education for 4 years leaves to take up a senior position at Little Kings. His expertise gave a boost to gymnastics. Mr W. S. Mitchell, M.A., B.Sc.

He was born and educated in Wellington (Wellington College, Victoria University College and Wellington Teachers' College). This was followed by a junior lectureship in Latin at V.U.C. from 1938-40.

During the war Mr Mitchell spent 1941-44 in the education branch of the R.N.Z.A.F.

He then taught at Palmerston North Boys' High School from September 1944 until the end of 1951 (mainly English, Latin and French).

He came to M.A.G.S. in 1952 as head of the Latin Department and was head of languages until his retirement at the end of 1975. He coached cricket and rugby until 1966 and then took over the chess club. He was also an officer in the Air Training Corps from 1952 and 1962. He was convenor of the staff room committee from about 1960 until 1975.

Though he headed a relatively small department he regards his classroom teaching of Latin and French as his main contribution to the life of the school, for he believed with Cicero that:

Haec studia adulescentiam accunt, senectutem oblectant, secundas res ornant, adversis perfugium ac solacium praebent, delectant demi, non impediunt foris, pernoctant nobiscum peregrinantur, rusticantur.

i.e. that these studies are an impetus to youth, and a delight to age; they are an adornment to good fortune, refuge and relief in trouble; they enrich private and do not hamper public life; they are with us by night, they are with us on long journeys, they are with us in the depths of the country.

Mr Mitchell was an active member of the Auckland Association of Language Teachers and the Auckland Branch of the Classical Association. He was president of the last-named body in 1969-70.

In 1976 he proposes to travel in Britain and Europe for up to six months and we trust that the quotation from Cicero is applicable to that also.

Mr A. J. Gibson, B.Ag.Sc. 1934-36, 1955-76

He joined the staff in 1934 after a brilliant career as an agricultural student and was immediately nicknamed "Hoot" after a then wellknown cowboy star of the screen. He did tremendous work in helping to establish the school form and agricultural course and in addition was senior master of the School House from

After that he left to continue his studies. It was confidently predicted that he would become one of the leading agricultural experts of New Zealand.

Just before the war he travelled to England to study with an international gathering of agriculturalists. His room-mate was a German! War became imminent and the two friends shook hands, the German returned to the Reich and Mr Gibson became an agricultural adviser to the British government.

Then during the course of his duties came disaster — a crash between his farm vehicle and a machine of war. For weeks Mr Gibson was unconscious, eventually to recover, survive the war, but with the legacy of perpetual enervating and, at times, excruciating headaches.

However, he still knew his agriculture and M.A.G.S. welcomed-him back with open arms in 1955.

With a newer generation of boys his name changed from "Hoot" to "Bert" but one thing never changed and that was the respect and affection with which he was regarded by staff and boys. To staff he was always the friendly, smiling fellow in the staffroom, a good fellow to yarn to whilst he rolled his ever-present "roll your owns". To the agricultural boys in particular he was the all-knowing mentor in their subject; a confident and respected friend.

During this period many boys owed their passes in S.C. Agriculture and Animal Husbandry to Mr Gibson's skilled teaching and besides that he found time to coach football teams and was for some years the rowing master of the school.

This writer trusts that he is not being disrespectful when he recalls that over the years headmasters, deputy heads, heads of departments and other indispensable people have left or been on leave and after a brief pause the school has settled down again. But never has the writer been able to recall such difficulty in making up the vacuum left when "Bert" was eventually forced to retire through ill health early in 1975.

Such is a true indication of the worth of such a man to the school.



SCHOOL REPORT

ALBERT TREVOR DAY

In the 54 years of its existence Mount Albert Grammar School has not often lost a staff member by death while still in service at the School. W. E. King and J. H. Jenkin, who died in 1963, and L. H. Yorke (died in 1965) are well remember-

ed by staff and Old Boys.

On August 9, 1975, death claimed Albert Trevor Day, who first joined the staff in 1971 as a part-time clerical assistant employed mainly in checking pupils' attendance and in the Bookroom. Not many of us knew that he had been a foundation pupil at our school and that he had then served a lifetime as a teacher under the Auckland Education Board before retiring on superannuation in 1963. He had also served for more than 4 years in the Army in World War II, including 21/2 years overseas in the Middle East.

Many school leavers will remember Mr Day as the man they had to satisfy when they handed in their text books. Mr Day was well aware of the high cost to the country of providing free text books for every school pupil, and he rightly ensured that books returned matched those listed in the records. Likewise masters who had omitted to record pupil absences accurately were politely but firmly reminded of their lapses. Mr Day was brought up in an era of high standards, and he helped us

all by reminding us of the importance of these standards.

Mr Day leaves a family of three married daughters and five grandchildren. The staff and the school extend to them our deepest sympathy.

JAMES WILLIAM GUEST

The staff and boys of the school express their sympathy to the Guest family for the loss of their son James.

On 24 May 1975 he was on a training ride planned from Auckland to Huntly and back. He was killed near Huntly when his bike was run off the road by a truck.

An outstanding cyclist he had amassed an impressive record in his short time in New Zealand. He was a member of the team that was National Junior Pursuit Champion. Also, he was second in the Auckland Junior 5 mile and Auckland Junior Sprints; third in the Open Individual Pursuit and he won the Auckland Junior 25 mile event, was third in the Auckland Junior 20 mile and 5th in the Auckland Junior 50 mile.

His interests were wide. He was a competent student and a better than average bassoon player, being a member of the Auckland Secondary Schools' Orchestra. Earlier he had been a member of the Tasmania Youth Orchestra.

Unassuming and ever available to help younger boys with their music or their school work or with their broken bike chains, he packed more experiences into his short life than many who lived to an advanced age. We were privileged to know him.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

The main feature of the year has been the progress on the new Audio-Visual-Library block. This has been disappointing. After a promising start last year, the contractors have been much slower than anticipated. However, the block will be ready for occupation at the beginning of next year and we look forward to making use of facilities worthy of our school. The staff involved in the Library and Audio-Visual work will, we hope, be able to carry out their work much more efficiently and easily after many years of making do with makeshift rooms and substandard conditions.

Of course, at the same time, the boys should gain very great benefit from the much more pleasant study areas in the Library and from the seminar rooms provided for the Senior School. Our thanks are due to the Education Department office for their co-operation and help in ensuring that the block will be equipped to the best modern standards. The Architects, Messrs. Crookes & Bolt, merit our thanks for the design of the building which, whilst containing all of the Departmental requirements, still fits in perfectly with our particular school design. Lastly, the Old Boys Jubilee Trust must be thanked for their splendid contribution which has enabled us to supplement the Departmental grants and thus furnish and equip the new building in a manner which we consider is fitting for the high reputation of our school.

The only other major work completed during the year was the up-grading of the Farm access road. For many years this road has been quite unsatisfactory and, with the increasing number of primary school visitors to the farm — some 6000 this year — who must walk up it, we have felt that it should be sealed. A generous grant of \$4000 from the Auckland Savings Bank has enabled the main part of this work to be done.

With the new Library, the old quadrangle will need re-development and a Ministry of Works landscape architect has been requested to prepare a plan for tree planting so that the old gaol-exercise-yard aspect may be done away with and the pleasant outlook to the new building enhanced.

Approval has been given for the designing of a new main complex at the N.W. end of the D. Block together with a new Drama Block behind the Hall. It is hoped that the Music portion of the school will be ready for occupation in 1977. Messrs. Crookes & Bolt have been appointed architects for the school and so we can look forward to a group of buildings fitting in perfectly with our existing ones.

In the Christmas holidays, the old Library will be converted to two temporary classrooms to provide extra teaching accommodation taken when four of the relocatable classrooms are removed.

We look forward once more to having part of our pleasant lawn surrounding the Sports Pavilion.

LIBRARY

Alas, the end of an era!

Our school library started in 1923 after a donation of £20 was made. Now over fifty years later our stock of books has risen to more than 9,000 with an annual expenditure greater than \$1,600. This year we have more than doubled last year's number of bought books.

Over the last decade the library has been growing rapidly and it was obvious to all concerned (as soon as we started stacking books on the floor) that a new and more improved library was necessary. And so it happened. February 1974 saw us all eagerly awaiting the opening of our new Audio Visual block planned for February 1975 and February 1975 saw us eagerly awaiting the opening planned for 1976. And now its happening; we closed early this year for stocktaking and the move to the new library.

It may be interesting to note that the library is no longer a place only for books. Ever since about 1974 we have received many audio-visual teaching aids: movie cameras, slide and film projectors, overhead projectors and tapes, records and record players, games, pens and posters — to name a few. Our latest addition to this mechanised library of the seventies was the video-tape equipment. The advantage of video over movie equipment is you can wipe the tape and start again and there is no developing process, just re-run the tape and watch the T.V. Monitor.

All this A.V. equipment has to be catalogued, like the books, with the instructions for use typed up and copied. So you can see that the quiet library of days gone by has become the resource centre of the school. If you want to make or show a movie, play or tape a record or TV show, book the movie room or xerox an article, come to the library. (Note: as an added extra we also lend books).


Through the doors of the library on a normal day over 200 boys and 20 odd teachers (that's 20 odd, teachers not 20, odd teachers) pass, taking either books or A.V. "hardware".

Our ONE Librarian, Mrs. Clapperton, has her work cut out for her day. She is responsible for the whole of this vastly complex piece of administrative machinery and must type, catalogue, stick on labels, cover books, write up overdues and issue and collect books and hardware (and that's just her first hour's work) all day and every day and this doesn't include the not so regular jobs like ordering, buying, tidying and organising.

Of course we must not forget our regiment of pupil librarians who attempt to (only usually when under pressure) the mundane tasks of putting away books and tidying shelves. And last but not least our teacher librarian, Mr. Murphy, whose job it is to co-ordinate, administrate, delegate and dictate (the latter is done in the staff room when trying to get staff members to return overdue library books.)

To these people the school owes a great deal. The Library/A.V. Centre would not function at all without their full time dedicated help.


















JUST THOUGHT/FOR A MOMENT IN THE EARLY MORNING
