




On the inside flap of the dust-jacket of both books is a short biography and photograph of Neville McMillan.


N.A.C. McMillan

Neville McMillan was born at Auckland in 1922 and was educated at Henderson School, Mt Albert Grammar School and Auckland University College, where he graduated M.A. in history. He taught at Mt Albert Grammar School from 1949 to 1955 and then transferred to Auckland Grammar School, where he has been senior history master since 1962. He played club Rugby at various levels and has coached junior secondary school teams since 1950. He was an Auckland Under-16 selector from 1972 to 1976 and the chairman of the Auckland Secondary Schools' Rugby Union from 1974 to 1976, and convenor of selectors from 1977.
