SCHOLARSHIP and YOU.

Scholarship recognises and rewards only the very the top and it is stating the obvious that success in any arena, whether academic, sporting, or the arts, is not without sacrifice.

The following information is provided to ensure students are fully aware of the realities of the challenge(s) Scholarship presents, and the monetary reward available to them, should they be prepared to accept the challenge to sit these extra examinations and aim to achieve their very best. It must also be acknowledged that to achieve your best, to be the best requires commitment, drive, perseverance, honest effort and inevitably some sacrifice.

In a nutshell, “Per Angusta, Ad Augusta”.

It is important to note that in the first instance the focus should be the commitment and work ethic required to achieve your very best academic results in your achievement standards and aim to get “Achieved with Excellence” endorsements across all subject areas.

Then, for best scholarship success, the same effort to be the best, needs to be applied across all subject areas, if you are to be eligible for the very top monetary awards.

At Mount Albert Grammar School, support and guidance is offered to those students who are prepared to make the commitment to do their best in their chosen subjects. But this is exactly that, support and guidance, the hard work must come from you.

Much of the following Scholarship information is taken from the NZQA website. It is provided to ensure that students who have the both desire and ability to attempt the Scholarship examination(s) are fully informed, and have access to the necessary information and support to enable them to achieve their best.

Scholarship – NZQA Information

In the first instance the most obvious point to make is that **Scholarship is NOT an NZQA qualification**. It is a separate examination, offered in specific subjects, which provides the chance to be rewarded financially, for top academic performance(s). Scholarship provides recognition and monetary reward to top students, nationally, in their last year of schooling. Scholarship examinations enable candidates to be assessed against challenging standards that are demanding for the most able candidates in each subject.

Scholarship candidates are expected to demonstrate:

high-level critical thinking,

abstraction and generalisation,

and the ability to integrate, synthesise and apply knowledge, skills, understanding and ideas to complex situations.

WHY SHOULD I CONSIDER ENTERING?

Scholarship: Monetary Awards

Premier Award

- For the very top 5 to 10 candidates. The minimum eligibility requirement to be considered for this award is achievement of at least three Scholarships at "Outstanding" level in the same year. The number of recipients for this award is restricted and achieving the minimum requirement will not guarantee an award.
- \$10,000 each year for up to three years for as long as the recipient maintains at least a 'B' grade average in their tertiary study.

Outstanding Scholar Award

- For the next 40-60 top candidates. The minimum eligibility requirement to be considered for this award is achievement of three Scholarships with at least two at "Outstanding" level or more than three Scholarships with at least one at "Outstanding" level in the same year. The number of recipients for this award is restricted and achieving the minimum requirement will not guarantee an award.
- \$5,000 each year for three years for as long as the recipient maintains at least a 'B' grade average in their tertiary study.

Scholarship Award

- For candidates who achieve Scholarship in three or more subjects in the same year.
- \$2,000 each year for up to three years for as long as the recipient maintains at least a 'B' grade average in their tertiary study

Top Subject Scholar Award

- For the top candidate in each one of the Scholarship subjects.
- \$2,000 each year for up to three years for as long as the recipient maintains at least a 'B' grade average in their tertiary study.

Single Subject Awards

- For candidates who get Scholarship in one or two subjects
- A 'one-off' award of \$500 per subject (maximum payment \$1000)

Eligibility to receive a monetary award for recipients of all Scholarship awards:

For recipients of all New Zealand Scholarship awards:

1. The recipient must be enrolled in tertiary study in New Zealand with an accredited provider and must allow use of their name and school for publicity about their success:
2. Single Subject Awards are paid only in the first year of tertiary study in New Zealand:
3. For awards with second or subsequent year payments, recipients must maintain at least a 'B' grade average during their tertiary study in New Zealand with an accredited provider:
4. Note that StudyLink has separate requirements relating to payment of New Zealand Scholarship Awards.

Monetary awards for Scholarship cannot be accumulated over more than one year except as specified below.

Where a candidate meets the criteria for more than one monetary award, he or she will receive only the award of the highest monetary value, except where, a candidate receives a Top Subject Scholar Award and also achieves Single Scholarship Award in other subjects, in which case he or she will receive the Top Subject Award and a maximum of one \$500 Single Subject Award.

The monetary amounts for the Premier Award, Outstanding Scholar Award and Scholarship Award are available only for results obtained within the year of entry. Thus results cannot be aggregated over a period of time.

Award recipients have until 15 January 2016 to submit their award application following the receipt of their result in order to receive this monetary award.

On application to NZQA, recipients of monetary awards may defer receiving the award for up to one year after they leave school.

In terms of deferred awards, a student who gains:

1. an award in the same subject in more than one year will only receive one monetary award being the highest value award achieved:
2. a Single Subject Award in one subject prior to Year 13 and in a second subject in Year 13 is eligible for two one-off awards of \$500 as long as the student is enrolled in tertiary study as outlined in rule 7.3.2 b. up to the maximum payment of \$1000 for Single Subject Awards:
3. a Single Subject Award in a subject prior to Year 13, but fails to gain a Single Subject Award in the same subject in Year 13, will still be eligible to be paid for the award gained prior to Year 13:
4. a Single Subject Award in one or two subjects prior to Year 13 and the Scholarship Award in three subjects in Year 13 is eligible only for the Scholarship Award in the three subjects:
5. a Top Subject Scholar Award in the same subject in two different years will receive payment for one Top Subject Scholar Award only:
6. a Top Subject Scholar Award prior to Year 13 and a Single Subject Award in Year 13, or vice versa, will receive both awards.

New Zealand Scholarship results do not contribute towards the University Entrance.

ENTRY TO SCHOLARSHIP

Students can enter for Scholarship through an accredited New Zealand secondary school, ie. MAGS.

For full details of the entry requirements, see NCEA Rules and Procedures - Secondary Schools.

Eligibility to receive a monetary award

To be eligible to receive a scholarship award, a student must be enrolled in tertiary study in New Zealand for the years in which they receive monetary awards. This means that if you sit scholarship examinations at Yr 11 or Yr 12, you cannot claim the monetary award until you leave school and go on to tertiary education.

For awards with second or subsequent year payments recipients must maintain a 'B' grade average during their tertiary study in New Zealand.

For full details of the eligibility requirements, see NCEA Rules and Procedures - Secondary Schools.

How many candidates are awarded Scholarship?

Approximately 3 per cent of Year 13 students, **NATIONALLY**, who are studying each subject at Level 3 are awarded Scholarship, if they reach the standard that has been set. There is some tolerance around the 3 per cent, mainly for those subjects with few candidates.

So you can see that it is a challenge because it is the TOP students who sit these exams so you must aim to be the TOP OF THE TOP.

Is there a Scholarship examination for every NCEA subject? → **NO!**

NCEA MARKING COMPARED TO SCHOLARSHIP MARKING

How are NCEA exams marked?

NCEA Achievement Standards are all marked using criteria that award passes of Achieved; Achieved with Merit and Achieved with Excellence. Students are also able to earn certificate endorsements that recognise consistent Merit or Excellence levels of achievement both in individual courses and /or for their overall NCEA Certificate at Level 1, or Level 2, or Level 3.

Course Endorsement: This means if you gain 14 credits at Excellence level, of which three are from internally assessed standards and three are from externally assessed standards, you will earn a course endorsement of Excellence. If you gain 14 credits at Merit and/or Excellence level, of which three are from internally assessed standards and three are from externally assessed standards, you will earn a course endorsement of Merit.

Certificate Endorsement: NCEA certificates can be endorsed with Merit or Excellence. This means if you gain 50 credits at Excellence level you will earn a NCEA certificate endorsed with Excellence. If you gain 50 credits at Merit, OR a mixture of Merit and Excellence you will earn a Merit endorsement.

COMMENT: it is important to realise that universities are now able to use GPAs (grade point averages) to set entry levels for courses of university study. So, it is becoming increasingly important that students who aspire to tertiary education give themselves the BEST possible chance of getting into the courses they want. This means achieving their BEST possible grades across all subject areas – ie to achieve course and/or certificate endorsement.

Students, ie YOU, need to remember that entry to tertiary institutions is competitive AND that there are limited places in many courses AND that universities are not obliged to accept your enrolment. The universities have the luxury of being able to pick the best candidates, from the many applications received.

You owe it to yourself to give yourself the best chance of being one of those chosen, so need to ensure you give yourself the best chance of success. Developing good work habits and being self-disciplined will contribute to this.

Again, it is stating the obvious really that the more effort you make across ALL of your subjects, to achieve the very best results, puts you in the strongest position to do well in scholarship examinations.

How are Scholarship exams marked?

Markers allocate a score of 0-8 for each question in the Scholarship exams using subject specific schedules. These are based on a **Generic Marking Guide**, as follows:

An answer given a score of **8** is an **Outstanding** answer in all respects. Strong evidence of integration and synthesis. As good as could be expected under examination conditions. Accurate, comprehensive, coherent, lucid, perceptive.

A score of **1** shows Meagre understanding relevant to the question.

A score of **0** is awarded for answers that are blank or irrelevant.

NOTE: The work of the highest scoring candidates is reviewed by marking panels, to identify the top candidates in each subject. Exam booklets for candidates whose scores are close to either the Scholarship or Outstanding cut-offs are also re-marked, to ensure their results are correct.

Exams have between 3 and 6 questions and the scores for each question are indicated in the candidates' exam booklets, which are returned soon after the results.

Scholarship results are released towards the end of February each year. For details of Scholarship winners see Scholarship results.



*Note: There are reasons why the percentages of the Level 3 cohort achieving scholarship are significantly higher for Latin than other subjects:

- Latin has a very small Level 3 cohort. The large proportion of the cohort awarded Scholarship reflects this.
- Up to five candidates in addition to 3% of the Level 3 cohort can receive scholarship in each subject. Because Latin is undertaken by a very small number of candidates and have very small Level 3 cohorts, this discretionary flexibility resulted in high percentages of the Level 3 cohort receiving awards.


They have the knowledge about scholarship, and the standards and expectations in their subject areas that you need.

SHOULD I DO SCHOLARSHIP OR CONCENTRATE ON NCEA LEVEL 3?

Aiming to achieve your absolute best at Level 3 should contribute to your best opportunity for scholarship success.

You should focus on getting the best possible results in each of your Level 3 subjects and this in turn will put you in a good position to receive Certificate and Course endorsements. The higher your GPA (grade point average) the better your chances of getting into your chosen tertiary courses.

It is this well developed understanding of your subject area(s) that will give you a sound basis on which to **develop and apply** your own thinking about these subjects, so you will be in the best position to do the best in scholarship. This ability to apply your own thinking remains the key to scholarship exam success.

SHOULD I SIT SCHOLARSHIP WHILE IN YEAR 11 or YEAR 12?

Some consider the experience of sitting the scholarship exams useful for future success, others feel that the time invested preparing to practise scholarship might be better spent ensuring your best possible NCEA results.

Some students are successful when entering at Yrs 11 or 12, and some repeat the experience equally successfully.

However, others have stated they feel in hindsight that they 'peaked too soon' and may have been better to wait. This is best discussed with your teachers and parents. It is a matter for serious consideration and there should be a clear purpose for early entry,

IF I AM SUCCESSFUL AT SCHOLARSHIP WHILE IN YEARS 11 OR 12 CAN I 'BANK' MY SCHOLARSHIP AND SAVE IT UNTIL I FINISH SCHOOL?

The following outlines possible situations a student may face if they sit scholarship exams more than once OR sit scholarship as a Year 11 or 12 student:

Monetary awards cannot be accumulated over more than one year except as specified below.

Where a candidate meets the criteria for more than one monetary award, he or she will receive only the award of the highest monetary value. By exception, if a candidate receives a Top Subject Scholar Award and also achieves Single Scholarship Award in other subjects, he or she will receive the Top Subject Scholar Award and a maximum of one \$500 Single Subject Award.

The Scholarship, Outstanding and Premier monetary awards are available only for results obtained within the year of entry. Results cannot be aggregated over a period of time.

Award recipients will have until **a set date in January** of the year following the receipt of their result to submit their award application. Failure to do so may result in a forfeiture of the monetary award.

On application, recipients of monetary awards may defer receiving the award for up to one year after they leave school.

In terms of deferred awards, a student who gains:

1. an award in the same subject in more than one year will only receive one monetary award for the highest award achieved
2. a Single Subject Award in one subject prior to year 13 and a second subject in year 13 is eligible for two one-off awards of \$500 as long as the student is enrolled in tertiary study as outlined in clause 6.3.2 b. The maximum payment for one-off awards is \$1000

3. a Single Subject Award in a subject prior to year 13, but fails to gain a Single Subject Award in the same subject in year 13, will still be eligible for the award gained previously
4. a Single Subject Award in one or two subjects prior to year 13 and the Scholarship Award in three subjects in year 13 is eligible only for the Scholarship Award in three subjects
5. a Top Subject Scholar Award in the same subject in two different years will receive payment for one Top Subject Award only
6. a Top Subject Award prior to year 13 and a Single Subject Award in year 13, or vice versa, will receive both awards.

There are also University Scholarships for which **students can apply**. It is important that each student making the commitment to the challenge of preparing for and sitting Scholarship - whether in one of more subjects - is fully aware of the demands they will face.

That said, each student has access to tutorials from the scholarship teachers, that provide guidance, exposure to scholarship level exemplars and an environment that fosters and helps direct them to the breadth and depth of thinking required at this level.

Students need to be aware of the realities of scholarship, but also bear in mind that many other students face the same experience to achieve scholarship success and many will succeed.
